JENNINGS AND WOLFF INDICTED FOR LIQUOR

Two indictments were returned yesterday by the grand jury in the cases of Luke Jennings of Beagle and George Wolff of Forest creek, arrested by the sheriff's office for alleged moonshining and still possession charges. Jennings was indicted on the charge of possessing 200 gallons of alleged mash and an indictment was returned against Wolff for the alleged possession of a complete still, found at his home in the Forest creek section.

Authorities do not expect Jennings to fight the case, but Wolff has declared his intentions of taking his case to trial on grounds he did not know the still was on his property. The outfit was cleverly hidden under a covering of brush and logs.

CAR CRASH BASIS OF DAMAGE SUIT

In an amended complaint filed in circuit court yesterday, Ida Clarke of Medford is suing E. R. Brophy for the sum of \$25,000, as a result of an auto crash January 13, 1929, on the Crater Lake highway near Eagle Point. The plaintiff alleges the car, owned by the defendant, was driven in a careless, imprudent manner by a man named Gillihan.

She sets forth Gillihan was speeding, failed to give right-of-way and was in an intoxicated condition. Mrs. Clarke claims her car was forced off the highway and that she suffered external and internal injuries of such nature as to make life burdensome. She was forced to undergo a surgical operation and complains she is still suffering from the effects of the injuries and will for sometime.

COMMISSION WINS IN PHIPPS ACTION

In yesterday's circuit court trial of Charles H. Phipps against the State Industrial Accident commission, claimed due as the result of the death of his son Frehlyn in a sawmill accident here, the jury returned a verdict in favor of the defense. The attention of the court was occupied today with an equity case of Fred Middlebusher against Ben Geary, both residents of Trall.

Yesterday's case hinged on the contention of the plaintiff, claiming the dead boy to have been a means of support of the family, giving the bereaved a right to demand \$25 a month compensation from the state as long as either of his parents lived. The jury in its verdict declared the boy had not been of sufficient support to the family for it to receive extra compensation.

In his case against Geary, represented by Attorney Harry Skyrman, Middlebusher, represented by Attorney George Roberts, claims the defendant owes him a sum of approximately \$190 for supplies, dating back several years. Geary claims the amount has been paid, with the exception of a small balance.
