APPRECIATION FOR HELP IN BUILDING VOICED BY BISHOP

Voicing a deep appreciation to Medford and Jackson county people in general for their sympathetic cooperation and assistance during the construction of the new edifice, the Most Reverend Edward B. Howard, archbishop of this diocese, thanked the impressive dedication of the Sacred Heart Catholic church here today, with a brief congratulatory message. That the Medford church is not only an outstanding example of fine art and architecture, and indicative of a sincere regard for the local pastor, Rev. Francis W. Hince, but that it is eloquent of the spiritual devotion of the parishioners, was the thought embodied in another part of the sermon. The dedication and following services, which began at 10:30 with a procession from the parish house to the new edifice, were well attended, with more than 500 local people seated in the church. Ground's beautiful mass was sung by the choir during the solemn pontifical high mass, celebrated by Archbishop Howard and a number of visiting clergymen from various sections of the state. The sanctuary of the church was especially attractive with its additional floral decorations and candles, and the colorful throne, installed on the gospel side of the altar, and occupied at intervals during the ceremonies by the archbishop.

TRAFFIC ASSOCIATION HAS SECRET SESSION

The Rogue River Valley Traffic association held its regular meeting at the Hotel Medford this noon, and outside of talking shop, and the amount of ice used in a car of pears between this city and New York, transacted no business. 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NO MORE JOBS IN HOSS OFFICE FOR MARRIED WOMAN

SALEM, Ore., April 18.—(AP)—A letter sent by Secretary of State Hoss to the women employes of his department, made public today, definitely establishes a policy of the department against the employment of married women. It does not apply to married women who were already in the department when Hoss took office, but is effective from now on. Several days ago a note was sent one of the women in the department who was about to be married. "I am not asking for your resignation at this time, because you were not familiar with my views," said the note. "I would ask, however, that you make arrangements within a reasonable time so that I can consistently establish a policy of asking all our women workers who contemplate matrimony to plan on giving up their work at the same time." "Please do not feel that I discount the value of married women as workers, because I know that as a general rule they are exceptionally efficient, but I believe the best interests of more people are served if we open up employment to those who have no other means of support." This statement is also contained in the general letter: "Under present economic conditions," the letter says further, "where a great many people are seeking employment, and where actual want exists in a great many homes because of lack of work, I believe it to be the best interest of the people if preference in employment be given those persons who have no other source of income. Ability and value to the department, of course, have to be considered, but other things being equal, it is my belief that our state agency should go to those people who have dependents, rather than those who have someone to support them."
