PET PARADE WILL FEATURE OPENING OF ARMORY SHOW

It will be a "big parade"—that is, if it doesn't rain—with goats, dogs, cats, and maybe trained roosters, next Saturday morning at 10 o'clock, when Jackson county boys and girls traverse the streets of Medford with their pets as the first number on the program of the animal pet show to be held throughout the afternoon at the Armory.

The Humane society, which owes its existence to the soft-heartedness of its members, weakened and extended the deadline for entering pets in the exhibition to Friday night, instead of closing last night, as was formerly planned. As a consequence, pets are getting funnier and more numerous as the time progresses, according to Mrs. Sid Richardson, member of the Jackson County Humane society.

Scout Executive W. L. Bricker, during the show, will supervise a series of demonstrations in first aid, performed on the pets by Boy Scouts. One corner of the Armory will also be given over to a group of birdhouses and fountains, installed by the Crater Lake council as a feature of the exhibition.

ESPEE LINE PURCHASES MUCH NEW EQUIPMENT

New railway equipment costing approximately \$10,000,000 will be put into service on the Southern Pacific lines during 1929 and the early part of 1930, according to an announcement today by Paul Shoup, president.

Orders for the new equipment which have already been placed or are now awaiting bids, include 26 locomotives and tenders, 20 locomotive tenders of 16,000 gallon capacity; 60 passenger train cars, 117 freight train cars and 25 pieces of work equipment.

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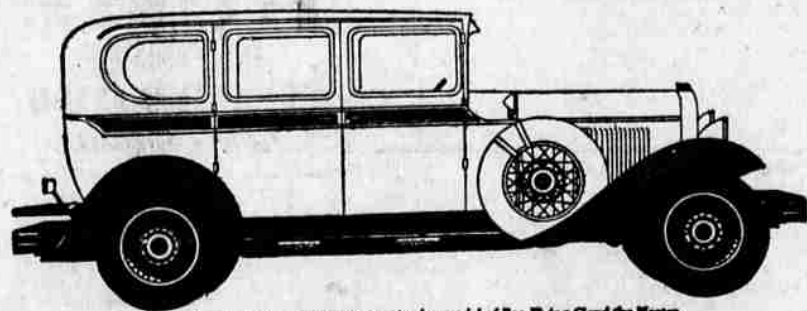
Jiggs' Dish Takedown.

An extensive improvement program is planned for the Ferguson Mineral Springs in the Sams Valley district, according to their owner, G. E. Ferguson who was in Medford yesterday. He recently purchased the carbonating apparatus formerly in use at the Ashland

Lithia Springs bottling works, and has installed it at Sams Valley to give the bottled mineral water an added "kick."

If present plans materialize, auto camp cabins will be constructed for use this summer, including all the present day conveniences. The cabins would be built by Medford interests and are expected to fill a long felt need at the springs, the popularity of which has shown a steady increase. Mr. Ferguson owns 160 acres surrounding the five springs, and a large share of it is in timber and on level ground.
