

HOUSE CLEANUP HELEN THROUGH FOR MORALS IS AS HOSTESS AT CHICAGO'S NEED DANCING CLUBS

Prominent Educators On Coroner's Jury Find Modern Youth a Problem—Auto, Roadhouse and Beer Flat Evil Sources.

CHICAGO, April 19.—(AP) Six prominent educators, sitting as a coroner's jury, have evolved from the investigation into George Lux's death last Sunday a series of recommendations for a "moral house-cleaning" of modern youth; a solution, their verdict said, of a problem "which seems to be becoming all too general for the public good."

Lux, 23 years old, was suffocated under an automobile in which he was riding with young men and women following a tour of roadhouses.

"We recognize that the automobile, the roadhouse, the beer flat and the speakeasy have been sources of social and moral deterioration, and urge that every effective means of control be employed to regulate or eliminate, as the case requires, those sources of corruption in the life of youth."

"The jury believes that when not only all schools but all other social institutions as well develop ways and means to make character ideals effective, a large part of the problem will be solved."

"We are convinced that the problems and conditions which face youth are not of their own making. They are not responsible for the fact that social conditions are unstable and unfavorable to the development of the highest type of life. We believe that in the final analysis, the determination of their behavior and the use of their young people are going to make of existing circumstances tests with the younger generation."

NEW YORK, April 19.—(AP) Helen Morgan, actress and entertainer, acquitted by a federal jury of maintaining a common nuisance, by the sale of liquor in a night club, is through with night clubs forever.

After hearing the verdict which ended her trial last night she said: "I don't want to ever think of it again. I have been through such a terrible day that I want to forget all about it. I am through with night clubs forever."

She was pale and trembling when the jury came in at 9:30 after having been out four hours and fifty minutes. When she heard the verdict she seemed about to faint. She partly regained her composure but began to weep softly and finally broke down and cried without restraint.

Her acquittal was the second defeat suffered by the government in two weeks in cases against Broadway night club hostesses. Last week Texas Guinan was found not guilty of maintaining a nuisance at the Salon Royale. In each case a special prosecutor came from Washington.

BILL AUTHORIZES IRRIGATION FUND

WASHINGTON, April 19.—(AP) Chairman Smith of the house irrigation committee introduced a bill today to authorize creation of a \$10,000,000 revolving fund to be loaned by the secretary of the interior to drainage and levee districts, counties, boards of supervisors and other political subdivisions.

The loans would be non-interest bearing and for a period not exceeding 40 years. They would be secured by serial refunding bonds to be deposited with the secretary of the treasury and would constitute the first lien on the lands.

The measure would provide that not more than \$10,000,000 be appropriated in any one year toward the fund.

Prince of Boston, father of the flier, which will provide for a memorial chapel on the main floor of the cathedral.
