14 DAIRIES OF VALLEY UNITE, PLANT ERECTED

Crescent Dairies, Inc. Formed With Ben Hilton, Manager—Latest Type Pasteurizer Installed—Officers and Directors Named—Start May 1.

As the result of 14 dairymen, all residing north of Medford, combining marketing interests, the Crescent Dairies, Inc., will be in operation here May 1, announced Ben Hilton, general manager, yesterday afternoon. The dairy plant is in the last stages of completion and is located in a concrete block building, owned by the corporation, on North Riverside avenue.

The plant is planned to be one of the most complete in southern Oregon and it is expected to pass the highest sanitary tests. The dairy equipment, such as the pasteurizer, with automatic control and recording thermometers will be installed this week by Louis M. Rinehart, late of Denver, Colo., where he was connected with the Windsor Farm Dairy, recognized as one of the best in the nation. The pasteurizer is nickel lined and is of the latest type procurable.

The corporation was formed six weeks ago and its officers are: George Hilton, Jr., president; Axel Jensen and John Anderson, directors; Rafael Jensen, secretary and treasurer, and Ben Hilton, manager. The 14 members have purchased the entire stock and it is not likely new members will be added very soon. The dairy plans to sell milk, culture buttermilk and cottage cheese in wholesale and retail lots, and has its market plans already completed, with the exception of probable expansion.

The dairymen, including one or two doctors, are in a district reaching as far as Sams Valley and including Central Point and Willow Springs. The dairy will have a complete refrigeration plant, sterilizing apparatus, boiler room, bottling and washing works and a cooling delivery room. The office will be located in the same building. Nathan Newcomer, a graduate of the O. S. C. dairy school, will be in charge of the entire plant. The plant will have direct connections with the city water and sewage systems.

PRESIDENT TAKES PART IN 'JOKE' LETTER TO D. A. R.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—(AP)—An unique compliment was paid Mrs. Adam Wyatt, retiring treasurer general of the Daughters of the American Revolution here tonight at the banquet closing the 38th annual congress of the organization.

The presiding officer, Mrs. Robert Reed, former vice president general, who did not deliver her prepared speech, in introducing Mrs. Wyatt to the 1000 delegates present read a letter which she said was dated "the White House," which said that Mrs. Wyatt had been considered for selection of secretary of the treasury in the cabinet of President Hoover and which praised the financial genius of the former treasurer general. Mrs. Wyatt explained that the letter was a joke prepared by the former officers of the organization, but said that it was done with President Hoover's acquiescence.

UMPQUA BROCCOLI CROP OVER PEAK

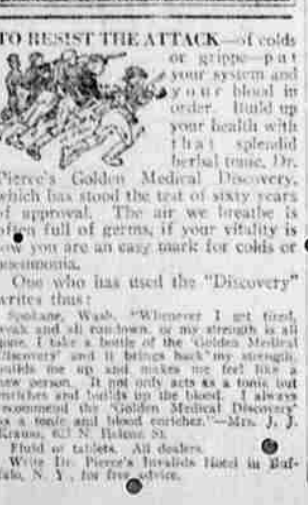
