RAIN DEFICIENCY IS DECREASING

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MIDWAY HIGHWAY CONSIDERATION IS PLAN WEDNESDAY

The county court at its regular session Wednesday will consider the matter of the Midway highway construction which has been before them for a couple of months.

The county court may give a final decision at this session, and again it may not. They have been applying considerable study to the question, and under the law have 60 days in which to make up their minds.

The road would give a direct outlet to the Sams Valley district, shorten the distance two miles, and eliminate 16 curves. It has the backing of the Sams Valley range and a large number of residents of central Jackson county.

The county court is said to view the road with favor, but fears upon making high prices for right of way, asked in several instances. An adjustment of this phase of the question is expected shortly.

GABRIELSON TALKS AT OPENING BULB AND FLOWER SHOW

There are at least 20 species of wild flowers peculiar to the Siskiyou and Rogue River valley, according to Ira N. Gabrielson, wild flower authority and member of the Oregon Gardens organization at Portland, who was the principal speaker at the combined meeting of the Greater Medford and Garden clubs at the Hotel Medford this afternoon.

The Red Bell, so popular among wild flower enthusiasts around Medford, is one specie he named, which is found only in this section of the country. Another is the Bolander lily, and another the lavender lamb-tongue, which grows profusely in the Siskiyou.

That here are perhaps more flowers peculiar to this section than one could find to individualize than any other single community of this size, was another statement made by the speaker.

Mr. Gabrielson stressed the importance of preserving the native plants and outlined methods for promoting their protection. The habit of digging wild flowers up by the roots, and other methods which tend toward their destruction and extermination should be discouraged, according to the speaker.

A large and attractive wild flower and bulb exhibition was opened in the lobby of the Hotel Medford this morning by the Garden club, assisted by Mr. Gabrielson. One particular display which drew considerable interest was that of the Oregon Garden's rock garden plants.
