(Continued from Page One.) negro of Richmond, Mo., is accused of robbing six houses and striking two women. A mob took him from prison, beat him almost to death, then returned him to the sheriff. That's not exactly your idea of perfect civilization. But, privately, members of the mob declared that their plan "worked."

After the beating, the negro said he wanted to plead guilty and be removed from Richmond as soon as possible. That an ignorant negro should commit a crime has no historical interest. But that a white mob should find satisfaction in beating a man that could not defend himself, is enlightening. America's recent usury debauch, pleasant for money lenders, worries the national treasury considerably. One result has been a drop of \$500,000,000 in the value of government bonds, of which more than \$11,000,000,000 are outstanding. The government worries also about the interest price it will pay on new financing. Months of profitable usury, stimulated by the federal reserve, and unchecked by any government agency, have destroyed the bankers' appetite for low rate government bonds. In his book, "My Industrial Philosophy," published by Coward, McCann, in New York, says Henry Ford, government should issue money, instead of issuing bonds, then retire the new currency, as it would retire the bonds. The government's money thus issued would call for no interest payment. It would be as good as government bonds, for it would carry the government's promise to pay, which constitutes all of a bond's value. "Inflation" and "flat money" and a dozen other arguments would be given by bankers that see no sound objection to putting the country on a basis of usury. The navy asks for two new battleships, to cost \$50,000,000. They would be two nice targets for foreign airmen if we had a war. But the country can afford them, and navy men, disinclined to fly or dive in submarines, must have some place to walk up and down. Past cruises have their use to harass enemy commercial shipping, or blockading enemy ports, airmen and submarines permitting. But of what use is a battleship? No use was made of Europe's dreadnaughts in the big war, with airplanes and submarines not yet half developed. In the next war they would be straggled and hidden, hidden behind commercial ships, as were Britain's dreadnaughts last time.
