MOORE HAMILTON CENTRAL POINT, IS MADE OSC EDITOR

For the first time in years a southern Oregon student was elected yesterday by a close margin to the editorship of the Barometer, student publication of the Oregon State college, when Moore Hamilton, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. T. Hamilton of Central Point, was chosen for the position. Hamilton, former editor of the Oregon Owl, comic monthly of the college, was editor last year of the smudge column of the Barometer editorial page, and he was vice-president of the Hammer and Coffin society while that organization was publishing the Orange Owl. He has also been the publicity chairman for the educational exposition of the college and is now the house president of the Tau Delta fraternity. He was awarded the Barometer efficiency cash prize last term for turning out the best Barometer as night editor. He was opposed in the election by Carl Totten, a popular member of the Sigma Delta Chi, national journalistic fraternity, pointed out as making his victory all the more noteworthy. As a result of his election, he will be forced to resign as senior class treasurer in order to assume his new duties.

Miss Crosson Won Associated Oil Aviation Race

Miss Marvel Crosson, well-known San Diego aviatrix, won the Associated oil special for women at the Oakland airport last Saturday, covering 15.5 miles in an OX-5 Waco. This was the first all-women's race to be held in the United States and was sponsored by the Associated Oil company, which offered a first prize of \$150 and \$100 to second place, which was won by Miss Maxine Dunlap of Alameda. Miss Crosson used Associated aviation gasoline and Cyclo motor oil, as did the winners of the three other feature contests of the afternoon. Ray Moore of Oakland piloted his Travelair OX-5 to victory in the 20.8 mile derby; Franklin Rose won the 26-mile pursuit race in his Stearman-Wright J-5 biplane, and W. D. (Denny) Wright won the dead stick landing contest, stopping within 11 feet of the given mark. The other race was won by Art Ayres of Alameda over a 20.8-mile course. This air meet was one of the most successful ever held on the Pacific coast and full credit is due the Society of Automotive Engineers, sponsors of the field day.
