

CULT LEADER FREED ON MURDER CHARGE

LOS ANGELES, April 26.—(AP)—Police here today had failed to find any evidence substantiating an affidavit made by Mrs. Evelyn Rosenkrantz, San Diego convict,

charging William E. Riker, leader of a religious cult, of killing "Mrs. Margaret White." They found no record that any woman of that name was missing, or had ever existed under the circumstances described in the affidavit.

SPORTS RAIN HAMPERS MAJOR LEAGUE BATTLE FRONT

Chicago and Detroit Only Dry Spots—Browns Beat Sox to Tie First Place—Gray Shows Great Form, On Mound.

The Browns shaded the White Sox by 3 to 2 and the Tigers mauled the Indians by 5 to 0. The Browns managed to step into a tie for first place with the idle Athletics, but first place at this stage of the season is nothing but a name.

What is more important than the actual position of the Browns is the pitching Sammy Gray exhibited in handoffing the troops of Leon Buchholz. For the third time this season, the Texas Terror made a winning entry in his pitching ledger, with no defeats anywhere to be seen.

The contest marked the home opening of the White Sox, but it remained something of a secret. Only 10,000 of the more hardy fans were lured into the cold park.

With opening day fast and successfully behind them, the Detroit Tigers began their work-a-day games by overpowering the Cleveland Indians as Emil Yde pitched excellent ball.

The Cardinals saw their home opening with Cincinnati postponed a second time and countered with offering the season's first double header as a Saturday attraction—first, that is, barring the morning and afternoon program always carried out in Boston on Patriots' day.

The other postponements will await the second trip for disposal.

M'EWAN REPORTS GAME PLANNED IN MIAMI BY LIGHTS

EUGENE, Ore., April 26.—(AP)—Captain John J. McEwan, head football coach at University of Oregon, announced today that there is a probability that Oregon will play the University of Florida in a post-season game on December 7 at Miami.

McEwan said the present plans called for the game at night in a large stadium to be rebuilt from the great arena which was erected for the Sharkey-Strickling fight.

"We are waiting for the final word from Florida," Coach McEwan said. "I think the plans will go through. If the game is arranged we will probably play St. Mary's college in California in the first of a series of post-conference games, and then move on across the country to Florida.

"The idea of playing the big game at night is quite unusual. Many teams in the east have been doing all or a large part of their practice at night under flood lights, but I believe this is the first time it has ever been proposed to play a major contest under the lights."

FRIEND BUFFALO BILL PASSES IN MISSOURI

LOUISIANA, Mo., April 26.—(AP)—Colonel Clarence Buell, one of the last surviving cronies of Colonel W. F. (Buffalo Bill) Cody, is dead at his home here. He had been ill for a month.

As a boy of 11, Buell left his home in Baltimore, Md., and made his way to Cheyenne, Wyo., where he became a cowboy, Indian fighter, and friend of Buffalo Bill. He had resided here 33 years and had served as a deputy United States marshal. He never revealed his age.

DRUNKEN DRIVER SLAIN IN BATTLE WITH PATROLMAN

PORTLAND, Ore., April 26.—(AP)—While his brother, a deputy sheriff was searching for him, Royal Weckert of Sherwood, a truck driver, was shot and killed here last night by Patrolman Sam Ramsey after the truckman said to have been highly intoxicated, had driven his machine into a touring car and then even battle to the officer.

Earlier in the evening Weckert's five-ton truck smashed into a light touring car. Weckert told the driver of the other car that he would meet him at police headquarters. He failed to appear and patrol cars were dispatched to find the truck, the license number of which was known.

Ramsey finally found the truck speeding up Corbett street. He forced Weckert to halt. As the officer was inspecting the truck, Weckert leaped from the cab and ran down the side of the road into a ravine. Ramsey after him, and the large truckman began beating him. The officer shot him and called an ambulance.

OLMSTEAD ORDERED TO SURRENDER ON MAY 15

PORTLAND, Ore., April 26.—(AP)—Emory Olmstead, former president of the Northwestern National bank here, and John E. Wheeler, former president of the McCormick Lumber company, were today ordered to surrender to the United States marshal on May 15. The order was issued by Federal Judge McNary after it had been requested by the United States district attorney.

Olmstead is under sentence of five years and Wheeler three years, to McNeil Island. Each was fined \$1000. They were convicted of misapplication of funds of the Northwestern National bank, now defunct.
