

THREE CHOSEN POPPY CONTEST ESSAY WINNERS

Alma Edler, Stanley Kunzman and Alice Kellogg Have Best Compositions in American Legion Auxiliary Contest.

Prize winners in the American Legion Auxiliary poppy contest as selected by three judges last night are Alma Edler, junior high student, who wrote "The Meaning of the Poppy"; Stanley Kunzman, Roosevelt, chosen from the group of fourth, fifth and sixth grade entries, and Alice Kellogg, Lincoln school, 8-year-old author of "The Story of the Poppy."

More than 50 essays were read last night and the judges had difficulty in deciding upon the three best, there being many which were remarkably well written. The local winning compositions will be sent to Baker where a group of judges will choose the best; essay in each of three divisions from state-wide entries. A prize of \$5 will be awarded in each case and, in addition, a suitable picture will be presented to the school room attended by the student winner.

START SIXTH ST. LIGHTING MONDAY.
