Personnel of Hillah Temple's Divan

Hillah Temple's Chief Rabban is R. E. Detrick of Ashland, whose name is a familiar one to all southern Oregon Masons. He has had an active part in arranging for the Medford ceremonial in which Hillah and Ben All Temples will confer the Shrine sections on a large class of novices.

Mr. Detrick is a Past Commander of Malta Commandery, Number 4, Knight Templars, is now High Priest of Skisyou Chapter, Number 21, Royal Arch Masons and is a member of Ashland Lodge Number 21, A. F. and A. M. He is also vitally interested in civic work, having served on the Ashland city council and as a director of the Ashland Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Tengwald is prominent Medford man, is Assistant Rabban of Hillah Temple and consequently active in helping work out the many details of the Medford ceremonial. Mr. Tengwald is an ex-service man, a member of Medford Post 15, American Legion, and is now Captain of Company A, 148th Infantry.

Mr. Chapman, High Priest and Prophet of Hillah Temple, A. A. O. N. M. S., filled the position of Captain of the Hillah Patrol for ten years, from 1918 to 1928. The patrol, under his direction, has creditably represented the southern Oregon temple in many ceremonials and at various Imperial Council Sessions.

In 1926, Mr. Chapman was Hillah's representative at the Imperial Council Session at Philadelphia. At the present time he is Standard Bearer in Malta Commandery, Number 4, Knight Templars.

In Gold Hill, where Mr. Chapman resides, he heads the volunteer fire department of that city. He is also a Legionnaire being a member of Medford Post Number 15.

A. K. Cass of Grants Pass is Oriental Guide for Hillah Temple, A. A. O. N. M. S. He is associated with the Grants Pass Josephine Bank and is a member of the Grants Pass Rotary Club.

Mr. Barnett is an active member of the Skisyou Lodge of Perfection and served on the reception committee for the recent Scottish Rite reunion. He has also been active in Hillah Temple for the last several years. In 1924, 25 and 26 he was second lieutenant of the patrol. In 1926, 1927 and 1928 was first lieutenant and in 1927 was Second Ceremonial Master although he resigned this office to devote his time to the patrol. In 1924 he had charge of the patrol at the Los Angeles ceremonial.

Mr. Barnett is active in civic work in Grants Pass, is in business in that city and holds the position of captain of the volunteer fire department.

One of Hillah Temple's most active nobles is L. P. Older, director of the temple and business manager of the patrol. He has the distinction of being the first business manager of Hillah's patrol and the organizer of the Medford Shrine Club, a popular organization of Medford Shriners. In 1927, Mr. Older held the position of Captain of the Guards and, at the present time is First Director of Ashland Court 108, Royal Order of Jesters.

JERRY JEROME IS POTENTATE HILLAH TEMPLE

Edson C. Jerome, affectionately called "Jerry" by his host of friends in southern Oregon and through the Pacific coast is deserving of much credit for making possible and successfully preparing for the joint ceremonial of Hillah and Ben All Temples in Medford today. As Potentate of Hillah Temple, Mr. Jerome has made an enviable record, climaxing his activities with today's gathering of California and Oregon wearers of the fez.

For several years, Jerry has been one of the most active of the nobles of Hillah Temple and, in 1927, attended the Imperial Council Session at Atlantic City as a representative of the southern Oregon temple. In addition to being Potentate of Hillah Temple, Mr. Jerome is Impresario of Ashland Court 108, Royal Order of Jesters. He is a member of Malta Commandery, Number 4, K. T. and was a member of the Philip Malcolm memorial class which received the Scottish Rite work in Medford this week.

Previous to coming to this city, Jerome was special representative for the General Superintendent of Transportation for the Great Northern railroad system, traveling throughout the United States, Mexico and Canada. In 1912 he moved to southern Oregon and was associated with the California Oregon Power Company when the first Prospect power plant was erected. Since that time he has engaged in various business enterprises in this city and constructed the building at Main and Riverside avenue where the East Side Pharmacy and other firms are located.

Mr. Jerome has been active in civic, fraternal and educational circles of this city for many years. He is a Past Exalted Ruler of Medford Lodge 1168, B. P. O. E., a member of the Medford Boxing Commission and an advisor of the Hi-Y boys' organization in the Medford high school.

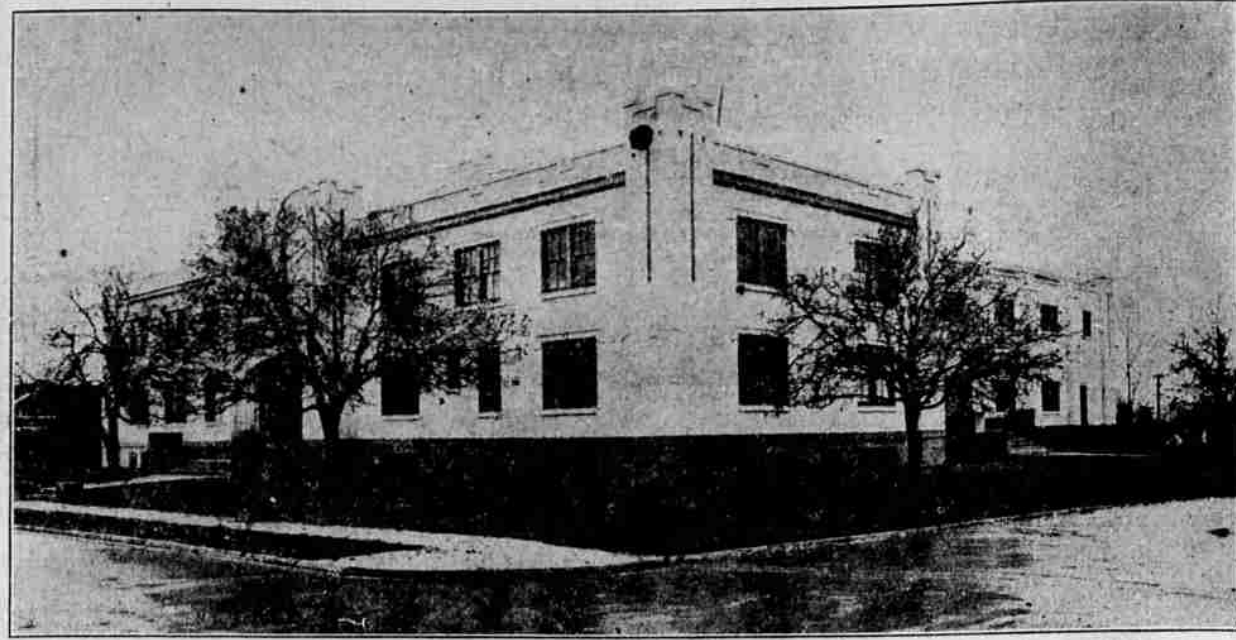
As a member of a number of committees of the Medford Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Jerome has devoted much time to civic development work.

CHICAGO PLANS A 'DREAM CITY' FOR 1933 EXPOSITION

By Allen L. Dalrymple (Associated Press Staff Writer) CHICAGO.—(P)—An enchanted fairy city is to rise in Lake Michigan off the shores of Chicago. Ingenuity of engineers has been called into play to obtain an effect of verticity at certain points without having the buildings anywhere near the height of the skyscrapers forming Chicago's skyline and the background of the fair.

A permanent fireworks impression will be given by shifting colored lights, passing over a group of columns, constructed of celluloid, tiling and glass. The columns will appear to move and their points to reach fantastic heights.

Volcanoes of light playing on clouds of gases and vapors—phosphorescent seas and canals illuminated by submerged colored globes—buildings seeming to reach the stars, towers, and columns disappearing into the heavens—buildings of celluloid and glass—interiors of fantastic structures, changing colors at the push of a button—noiseless electric launches—moving sidewalks and escalators running from floor to floor.

These are the suggestions to be submitted April 29 to the Chicago centennial committee by their architects.

Visitors to the 1933 exposition will all go down to enter the place. Moving sidewalks will carry them from the street level to the artificial streets below.

Each floor of the buildings will be set back to provide for streets and sidewalks. Visitors to leave the grounds must pass through several buildings.

"We are going to make it so easy for them to see everything that nothing will be overlooked," remarked Corbett. "At the same time we are going to give them something absolutely new in architecture."
