Foreign-born veterans can save five years by reason of their war service if they want to become citizens of the United States. Colonel J. P. O'Neil, in charge of the army recruiting station at Portland, points out. An act of congress passed March 2 and which will be in force until March 3, 1931, enables the veteran to obtain his final papers immediately and to become a citizen without the usual red tape required of other foreign-born residents. Instead of applying for his first papers and then waiting five years before obtaining citizenship, he can apply for citizenship at once. War service does not give citizenship automatically, as many veterans have supposed, but the new act will clear the way for such citizenship.
