

CENTRAL POINT TAKES HONORS IN TRACK MEET

Wins Secondary School Title With Phoenix Second--Winner Never Headed During Meet -- Oak Grove First In Rural Division.

Leading its nearest rival by 29 points, the Central Point schools won the annual Southern Oregon Field and Track meet yesterday at the county fairgrounds, by 181 points. Phoenix was second with 152, followed by Gold Hill with 106. In the rural division, Oak Grove took first place with 115 points, followed by Evans Valley with 42 1/2. Griffin Creek was third with 39 1/2.

Central Point took the lead early in the day and held it tenaciously until the most exciting race of the evening. Oak Grove also took the lead early and lost no ground in the events that followed.

There were no school records broken, but in a number of events there were exceptionally close contests. In last year's meet, Phoenix won first place with 214 points to 175 for Central Point, having a larger score than the winning team at this year, due to having less competition. Gold Hill and Jacksonville did not have complete teams.
