## FINALS MONDAY TO DECIDE HIGH NET CHAMPION

Starting with 50 players competing, Medford high's 1929 tennis tournament designed to establish the new school champion and the first five ranking players for the year, is down to the semi-finals with only four players remaining. They are Al Steehr, Bill Bowerman, J. Moras and Jimmy Edmiston. One of these four will be crowned champion Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock, when the finals will be played.

In the semi-finals Bowerman will meet Steehr Sunday morning at 10 o'clock, and Edmiston will face Moras. The two winners will go into the finals. All matches will be played on the new concrete courts at the high school.

All of the preliminary matches up to the quarter finals were run off last week under the watchful eye of Alvin Tollefson, tennis coach. Saturday morning Bowerman defeated Harry Garfield 6-3, 6-0, Steehr took A. Carley 6-1, 6-4, and Edmiston eliminated Ernie Conrad 6-3, 6-2.

Tennis has caught on with a bang at the local school since the completion of the new plant a month ago. Alvin Tollefson, former Oregon State star, now a Central Point banker, has been named coach, and Jimmy Edmiston has been made team manager. Matches have been arranged with Ashland, Grants Pass, Eugene high, Albany, University high of Eugene, and Salem.

A beautiful silver loving cup emblematic of the school championship will be presented to the champion by the student body, with a consolation cup going to the runner-up. The trophies were donated to the student body by Lampport's and C. E. Fruit company.

## BRITISH WIN IN CUP PLAY UPSET
