

# DISTRICT MEET WOMEN'S CLUB, ASHLAND, ENDS

Inspiration in the direction of social, educational, civic and legislative improvement through their club activity was the accomplishment realized by the 100 or more members of the first district Federation of Women's Clubs of Oregon, who closed their two-day convention in Ashland at 4:30 yesterday. The 18 clubs represented at the convention both contributed an approved idea during the program of talks and round table discussions that will give them new incentives and projects upon which to act when they take their respective places within the five counties from which they attended the annual meeting, according to Miss Grace Chamberlain, president of the first district federation.

Miss Chamberlain, following the close of the convention yesterday, left on the evening train for Quebec and the first section of a year and a half vacation trip to Europe and foreign lands. Having made an intensive study of women's club work throughout her many years of activity, she intends to add to her present advanced state of knowledge by visiting women's organizations in Europe. That she may be able to assist materially in promoting an improved educational program in federation activity upon her return from abroad was the expressed aim of Miss Chamberlain shortly before her departure yesterday.

Mrs. G. J. Frankel, state federation president, of Portland, was the guest of honor throughout the two-day session, having arrived in Ashland Friday noon in time to attend the luncheon given the delegates by the Ashland Civic Improvement club as hostesses.

The entire morning Friday was given over to the registration of delegates from the various clubs throughout Jackson, Josephine, Klamath, Lake and Curry counties. The afternoon session was called to order by Miss Chamberlain, assisted by Mrs. Alex Grant Jackson, second vice president, of Grants Pass, and Mrs. A. J. Hanby, third vice president, of Medford. Other officers of the federation who were active in welcoming delegates the first day were Mrs. Wm. J. Glenn of Talent, recording secretary; Mrs. Wilbur Jones, Klamath Falls, corresponding secretary; Mrs. Oscar Shepard, Rogue River, treasurer, and Miss Elizabeth D. Palmer, Ashland.

The climax of the convention came with the selection of Grants Pass yesterday afternoon as the next convention headquarters. At that meeting, to be held the latter part of next April, new officers for the following two years will be elected.

Clarence Davies of Eagle Point acted in the capacity of master of the evening, while Albert Straus, Sams Valley Pomona grange master, filled the position of overseer during the service.

Mrs. Leonard Freeman of Central Point acted as chaplain and John Tyrell of Central Point, as lecturer. Floyd Charley of the Lake Creek district was steward. Hershel Harper of Sams Valley, assistant steward and Miss Ruth Frink, Sams Valley, lady assistant steward; Leonard Freeman, gate keeper; Mrs. Arnold Bohmet of Central Point presided over the court of Pomona, while H. The large number of members began arriving early Saturday morning manifesting sufficient genuine enthusiasm in the Pomona grange activity, to enable them to abandon for the day the quantity of farm work now demanding attention.

The morning session was called to order at 11 o'clock by Pomona Grange Master Albert Straus of Sams Valley, and was attended by County Agent R. G. Fowler and members of the eight subordinates within Pomona grange. Following the meeting, the members adjourned to the hall below where a bounteous luncheon of home cooked food and pastries was served by the ladies of the grange, Clara Parker, of the Farmers' Cooperative Exchange, was a guest at this luncheon and round table discussion.
