BROWN RETURNS FROM TREE PLANTING TRIP

Lee P. Brown, examiner of the Crater National forest staff, arrived home last night from the Bear creek unit of that forest where during the past week he planted 1500 western yellow pine trees in the cut-over land of the Pelican Bay Lumber company, where the forest management has started an experiment in timber reforestation growing.

This experiment, which will extend over a period of years with plantings in that section each year, is to determine the site factors, in replanting cut-over lands, as to temperature, soil, shade and moisture, in the way of learning the best time and location to plant in order to have growth attended with best success.

The next planting in this section will be done next year.
