G. L. Bullen of the Red Crown service station, spent Wednesday afternoon in Medford.

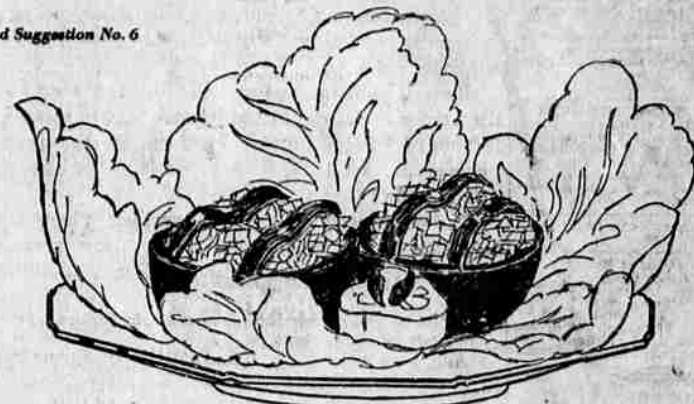
Master Everett Joekel has been absent from school this week on account of illness.

Golfer Drives 360 Yards in Oakland For Hole in One

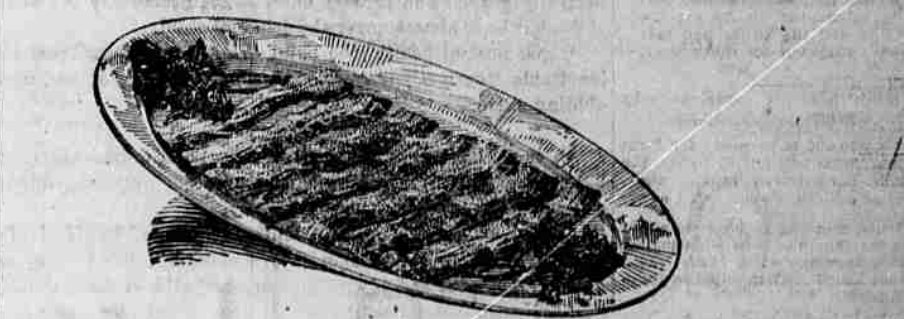
