"We are right in the midst of the frost season, the most dangerous time in the year for the pear orchardists in the Rogue River valley," observed Dr. J. F. Reddy of Medford, at the Imperial. "However, every precaution is taken to combat frost. The government has a frost expert on duty and orchards are equipped with thermometers and with stoudege pots, and at the slightest indication of danger the smudges start, thereby raising the temperature around the trees, so that the frost is dissipated. It looks to me as though this will be the best year yet the Rogue River valley has ever enjoyed. It looks not only like a bumper crop but as if prices will be up and the orchardists will make some money. Everyone knows, of course, that Medford is the shipping point for the greatest pear district in the world, pears being to Medford what apples are to Hood River or salmon to Astoria.—The Oregonian.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., May 3.—(P) For the first time in many years North Bend and Marshfield have buried the baseball hatchet and this season will fight shoulder to shoulder in an attempt to bring the Valley-Bay League pennant to the Coos Bay peninsula.
