

CARKIN SEAT TO REMAIN VACATED UNTIL PRIMARIES

There is no provision in the law for the appointment of a member of the legislature to take the place of John Carkin, who recently resigned as representative from this county.

The law provides that if a special session of the legislature is held while the vacancy exists, a special election must be held to fill the unexpired term.

This means there will be a vacancy until the primary in 1930, when the term would have expired along with that of Wm. Briggs of Ashland. Senator Geo. Dunn's term

also expires next year and there will be a senator and two representatives to elect. Several "political lightning rods" are already hoisted for these positions.
