### HIGH SCHOOL BOYS HEAR EDUCATIONAL ASPECT OF CIRCUS

Two hundred undergraduates at the senior high school this noon heard all about the Al G. Barnes circus, which will come to Medford, Thursday, May 16. That is, they heard all about the educational side of the circus as embodied in a talk given by Cliff McDougall, one of the advance publicity directors of the show.

That the circus, like every other form of amusement, has changed along progressive lines until it has become one of the most valuable mediums of education in the country, was stated by the speaker, who hastened to add that the change did not mean that it had lost any of its glamour or color.

"On the other hand, it has accumulated a greater variety of animals and specialty numbers as the years progressed," he said.

Mr. McDougall described some of the colorful life and traditions under "the big top." He told about Clown Alley, where the clowns dress and make up and often originate some of their best wise cracks. Then there is Buggy-Whip Row, Main street and Broadway or Spangle boulevard — all avenues trod by the big circus family.

He explained that the zebra is the hardest animal to train. The lion, although reputed to be the king of beasts, often succumbs to the ferocity of the tiger, which can leap as high as eight feet in the air, while the former can spring only five feet.

### PRIVATE FUNERAL SERVICE MONDAY FOR CARTOONIST

NEW YORK, May 3.—(AP) Private funeral services for Thomas Aloysius (Tad) Dorgan, noted newspaper cartoonist, will be held next Monday.

"Tad" died in his sleep at his home in Great Neck, Long Island, yesterday from a heart ailment that kept him confined to his home for the past seven years.

Although one of the most capable of sport critics, especially on boxing, "Tad's" clientele was by no means restricted to followers of the sports pages. As a connoisseur of slang he had few, if any equals. Through his daily cartoons he originated scores of new expressions which quickly caught the popular fancy.

Out of his fertile brain came "Twenty-three, skidoo," "Yes, we have no bananas," "hard-boiled egg," "appleauce," "cake eater," "the cat's meow," "nickel nurse," "nobody home," "the first hundred years are the hardest," "for cryin' out loud," "you tell 'em," and literally scores of other slang expressions that have crept into everyday use. He it was who first termed an overcoat a "benny" and called feet "dogs."

### 400 RESCUED IN FIGHT WITH SEA

TOKYO, May 3.—(AP)—A thrilling tale of rescue of more than 400 persons from the storm-lashed Japanese steamer Goyo Maru was told in brief radio messages from the steamer Hachiro Maru today. The Goyo Maru, under Russian charter for fishing off the Kamchatka banks, ran into a violent snowstorm Wednesday night in the Kronotski gulf and was forced aground.

Argo of the field artillery, Fort Sill, are to compete in the international jumping competition at Warsaw, Poland, June 1 to 12; the international concourse hippique at Cologne, Germany, June 16 to 23, and the famous Dublin horse show at Dublin, Ireland, August 6 to 9.

### REFUSE TO SET INDIAN TRIAL FOR MEDFORD

PORTLAND, Ore., May 3.—(AP)—Trial of Teddy Captain, Klamath Indian, charged with second degree murder of a tribesman, Morris Lotches, was set for June 19 in

federal court today. Captain's attorney's request that the trial be set for Medford was denied. Judge McNary raised the Indian's bond to \$7500. Captain declared at the time of the shooting that another Indian had insulted Captain's mother and sister and that as he aimed to shoot him, that Lotches, Captain's friend, stepped into the line of fire.
