

### PETITION CLOSING ANCIENT ROAD ON NORTHEAST ROGUE

A petition has been filed with the county court asking that a road on the northeast side of Rogue River, extending from opposite Gold Hill to a point near the Copco plant be closed. The county court journey over the road this morning on a tour of inspection.

The county court expects to visit the Blue Ledge mine and inspect the road leading thereto within the next week or ten days.

### PRELIMINARY WORK AT AIRPORT GOING ON 24 HOUR BASIS

A tractor, hauling a three-bottom gang plow, is working 24 hours a day and a scarifier during day hours in preliminary work, which started Thursday on the new Medford airport. The scarifier operates on a range of four feet deep and eight to 10 feet wide. Fifteen men are employed on the job. The trees have been cut from the field.
