Yesterday was the biggest day in years for tax payments at the sheriff's office, where over \$132,000 was paid for payment of the first half of the 1928 taxes. The two largest checks came from the California-Oregon Power company for \$45,950 and from the Oregon Lumber company for over \$33,000. The tax department, which jammed all day yesterday, was nearly packed today with property owners waiting in line to make payments, keeping a small army of help busy awaiting their needs. EXCLUSION STAND FOR FRESH FRUIT AGAIN AFFIRMED

At a special meeting of the Rogue River Valley Traffic association today, the organization reaffirmed its stand favoring the exclusion of fresh pears and apples from the provisions of the Farm Relief bill, now before congress. The meeting was called at the request of H. H. Kipp, head of the marketing committee of the Portland chamber of commerce, and officials of the Southern Pacific railway asking them to re-consider their opposition. The exclusion of fresh pears and apples is provided for in an amendment presented by Senator McNary, introduced at the request of northwest and California fruit-growers. Southern Oregon fruit-growers contend that the inclusion of pears and apples in the farm relief bill would place their fruit upon the same quality basis in the eyes of eastern and foreign trade, as the middle western fruit, and eventually prove a detriment to northwest growers. The association voted to again send telegrams to the Oregon delegation in congress, urging them to vote for the McNary amendment. According to press advices today the upstate small fruit and truck garden raisers have filed a vigorous protest against the McNary amendment, and have enlisted Portland interests in their behalf. Traffic associations of the Wenatchee, Yakima and Hood River fruit districts take the same position on the amendment as the local organization.

LINCOLN SCHOOL IN SLIGHT LEAD FOR FIELD MEET

The Lincoln school was only leading the Jackson school by 49 to 48 points early this afternoon in the city inter-school track meet, which began this forenoon with over 200 students participating. The freshmen girls were leading the sophomore girls in the inter-class high school division by 14 to 3, while the seventh grade girls of the junior high were trailing the eighth grade girls by 14 to 21. A boys and girls in the grammar school division are taking part, while in the junior and senior high divisions, only girls are entrants. The meet has only twelve events, including 50-yard dash, 70-yard sprint, 440 relay, running broad jump, standing broad jump, running high jump, hop, skip and jump, shot-put, basketball and baseball distance-throwing, and 100-yard dash. An outstanding record of the day included a running broad jump of 13 feet by Don Higdon, 12-year-old eighth grade student of Junior High.
