

4000 HERE FOR I. O. O. F. MEET MAY 20 TO 23

Committees Named and Preparations Started For State Convention—Street Parade Will Be Feature of Many Public Functions.

With the forthcoming grand lodge convention of Odd Fellows and Rebekahs of Oregon to be held in Medford May 20, 21, 22 and 23, but two weeks away, preparations by the committees of the local lodges are fully outlined and are entering upon the final phases.

Practically every feature has been arranged for, and the local fraternity is beginning to feel the assurance the 1929 convention will be second to none in lodge history in this state.

There remains but one thing which now gives any degree of concern, and that is the housing problem. With an influx of probably three and four thousand outside people, it will readily be observed that providing sleeping quarters is a serious matter.

The hotels, rooming houses and apartment houses have been reserved and many private homes have been placed at the disposal of the committee, but there is still need for many more rooms.

Those having rooms they can spare during the convention will confer a great favor to the local lodges by notifying John A. Perl, chairman of the rooming committee.

In all there are eight branches of the order which will be represented in Medford—the subordinate, encampment, canton, Samaritan, Rebekah, ladies' auxiliary, lady Muscovites and Zuluans. These will require a number of meeting places, and the armory, Elks temple, W. O. W. hall and K. of P. hall have been secured.

Augmenting the I. O. O. F. hall registration and information headquarters will be established in the Baptist church, a central and convenient location.

The only possible disappointment looming on the horizon is that Frank Martin of Boise, Idaho, grand sire of the sovereign grand lodge of the U. S. and Canada, may not be able to be present, owing to an affliction which may put him under a surgeon's knife.

One of the big features of the convention week, and one in which the public as well as the lodge fraternity will be much interested, will be the street parade on Wednesday evening, May 22. The Medford lodge has offered substantial prizes for float features, including the best float representative of Odd Fellowship (Medford lodges eliminated); any organization or firm, fraternal or otherwise, in Medford or elsewhere. These must be trucks or wagons.

And for best decorated auto. These prizes should be an incentive to have a number of attractive floats in the parade. Information concerning them will be furnished by E. L. Bateman.

There will also be several bands in the parade, among them the I. O. O. F. band of Eugene, which will be here dispensing music during the entire convention. Grants Pass promises to send a band or drum corps, or perhaps both; the local Elks band and Boy Scouts drum corps.

There will be other functions open to the public—the grand reception Tuesday and the canton exercises and dance Monday evening.

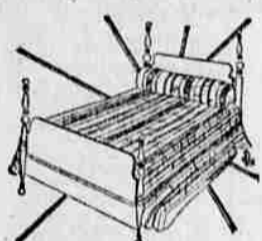
