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WOMEN INVITED TO ATTEND FREE DEMONSTRATIONS

Cordial invitation has been extended to southern Oregon women to attend interesting demonstrations of frozen salads, desserts and confections which will be held during the week ending Tuesday, at the Medford Electric company. Mrs. M. R. Hare, who is associated with the Knox Gelatine company and is recognized as an authority in home economics, will conduct the lessons in the show rooms of the Medford Electric, using two models of General Electric refrigerators.

Mrs. Hare has had considerable experience in conducting demonstrations and giving lectures before women's organizations, and her delicious recipes for frozen desserts, chilled soups, salads, appetizers and breakfast dishes will appeal to women of this city and the Rogue River valley.
