

DOUBLE PROGRAM
KIWANIS FEATURE
AT NOON MEETING

Two complete and separate programs were presented at the Kiwanis club this noon, under the direction of E. H. Hedrick, program chairman. The first covered the subject of "Community Health" with Dr. W. S. Walker, field director for the American Public Health Association of New York, as the principal speaker.

Dr. Walker, who has been here for the past few days in the interest of making a survey of health activity in Jackson county for the assistance of the national and local bureaus, commended this county on the co-operation given the local unit. He emphasized the fact that the health department is organized for the protection and promotion of health, and is not an agency for medical charity.

Miss Mildred Carlton, president of the Jackson County Health Association, preceded Dr. Walker with a brief account of the work being done here, and made a plea for the 100 per cent support of the unit activity by the service clubs of Medford.

Dr. Walker will leave tonight for the north, and will be followed here next week by C. B. Crittenden, associate field director from New York, who will complete the survey.

The second part of the program was devoted to the observance of Oregon day, celebrated last year at Champer on May 2. This feature was in charge of Principal R. B. Finch of Washington school, who gave a brief sketch of Oregon history. He in turn introduced Miss Alice Cronmar, music instructor at the school, who presented her chorus in a group of songs including "Oregon My Oregon" and "The Valley of the Rogue." An Oregon song to the tune "Oh Susannah" was also sung by the chorus, accompanied by the harmonies by Helen McAllister.

An explanation of the Oregon flag and its symbols was effectively made by Terkie Marston, while Lewis Campbell gave a clever exposition on the Oregon state motto, the state bird and the state flower.

MONUMENT TO PILOT
HEROES IS PLANNED

A memorial to be constructed in honor of pilots who sacrificed their lives in the air mail service is to be built at Murfreesboro, Tenn., and the Medford Chamber of Commerce has been asked to have a part in its construction.

The building, unique in every respect, will be located on the site of the Interstate Airlines airport and bricks from every part of the nation will be used in its construction, coming to Murfreesboro by air mail. The memorial will be surrounded by a continuously burning beacon, not only to commemorate the dead of the air service but also to act as a guide to present pilots.

A prize of \$100 will be given to the individual, firm or organization sending the most bricks by air mail and a \$50 prize will be given to the individual, firm or organization sending a brick by air mail the longest distance from Murfreesboro.

DEATH UNMASKS "MAN" AS WOMAN

"Peter Stratford," Who Masqueraded As Man, Attracted Women Through Ability to Write Charming Letters

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., May 6.—(AP) It was the appeal of the written words of Peter Stratford, who disclosed "he" was a woman shortly before "his" death in Oakland, Cal., Thursday, which drew two women of the film colony here to "him," they revealed today.

Miss Alma Thompson, employed at a film studio, denied she was personally acquainted with the woman who had masqueraded as a man for many years, but said she had known "him" through Mrs. Beth Rowland, his "wife."

The letters she had sent "him" were written through sympathy because of the lingering illness which brought death, she said. "I was working at Unity school in Kansas City, in the Healing department," Mrs. Rowland, actress and screen writer explained, "when I found a letter asking prayer for a man by the name of Stratford, who lived at Hillside, N. J."

"The letter interested me to the extent of causing me to break the rules of the institution, and I replied personally. His letters were literary gems. I must have received over 600 air-mail and special delivery missives.

"My letters to him also seemed to be the very breath of life and often became a very great burden to me, because if I neglected to write, his health was apparently affected."

Mrs. Rowland said she previously had been married and wrote that she "never again would enter into a physical marriage." She con-

tinued: "I suppose that was where he could justify himself. The very thought of marrying him was utterly abhorrent to me, but because of his pitiful condition and the idea of love that had been built up in the long correspondence, I felt I had to go through with it.

"He remained in Kansas City two or three days after the marriage, then he left for San Francisco. The following year I wrote him at intervals. Then he wrote me that he was so desperately ill that if I did not come to him he would die."

Mrs. Rowland said she joined "him" at Niles and for two years prepared "his meals" and nursed "him" while he was alternately working or ill in bed. Despite their constant close association, she declared, it was not until five months ago that she learned, through "his" own disclosure that "he" was not a man.

"I came to Hollywood intending to get an annulment from this strange contract," she said, "but my reaction of my suffering with him made me ill and I was unable to seek employment.

"I wrote Peter Stratford twice after my arrival in this city, when I discovered he was corresponding with my friend. Finally, disgust caused me to break off all communication. I understand she had sent him money each week for his sustenance."

Miss Thompson's mother had denied that her daughter knew Peter Stratford, who some 20 years before had been known as Dersley Morton.
