Kitten Ball League Adopts New Rules and a Schedule

It was decided at the meeting of the city kitten ball league, recently held, that a \$5 prize would be given to the player making the most home-runs during the schedule, this prize to be donated by the teams in the league.

It was also decided that if all teams were agreeable the schedule would be played over twice, which would mean playing until about August 1st. This, however, must be decided upon not later than May 15th and agreed upon by at least a majority of the teams in the league.

Messrs. Walt Antle and Al Hagen have been unanimously appointed as umpires, both men having expressed their willingness to serve. No player once playing with one team will be allowed to play with another. Each manager is re-
