**ORCHARD HEATING  
SURVEY MADE BY  
HORTICULTURIST**

The first comprehensive survey ever made of orchard heating in the Medford district, for the year 1929, has just been completed by L. P. Wilcox, in charge of the horticultural work of the county agent's office, which contains some very interesting information, and shows among other things that 35 of the valley growers smudge this season their 2665.0 acres, approximately one-third of the heating acreage of the valley, and that the great majority of the smudging growers heated by oil.

This survey covers pear, apple, peach and apricot orchard heating, and shows the total orchard storage of fuel to be 435 tons of briquets and 578,190 gallons of oil.
