

**SALE OF BITTERS ON FRONT STREET COSTLY TO THREE**

William Rinehart, Archie Sutherland and Rankin Estes, proprietors of three front street cardrooms and soft drink establishments, were fined \$250 each in justice court yesterday, on charges brought against them by federal officers for selling bitters and other medicines containing alcohol, for other than medicinal purposes.

Harold Sutherland and Harvey Taylor, bartenders, were each fined \$75 on the same charge. A sixth defendant, Dave Lench, also clerk, was scheduled to plead today.

The arrest of the six men came as a part of an extensive dry raid campaign, netting over 20 prisoners, principally on charges of sale. It is possible more arrests may be made.

So far, disposition has been made of the following cases: George Reed, sale, five days and \$500; Lida Wolgamatt, sale, \$100 fine; Leland Shidy, 40 days and \$250 fine; Auntie King, sale, four months; George Wolff, bound over to federal court on sale charge; Joe Marcham, bound over to federal court.

**RADIO STATION IS NEAR COMPLETION FOR NEW SERVICE**

Construction of the new government radio station near this city is practically three-fourths completed, according to R. A. Martin, superintendent in charge of construction, who reported today preparations are complete for the actual erection of the steel towers, 128 feet high, 400 feet apart and on concrete bases of 150 feet square.

The building, in which the equipment will be located, has been constructed and has dimensions of 27 feet by 25, and includes a basement, one story and an attic. The furnace and stove rooms will be located in the basement, while the radio apparatus, including generating room for the motors, will be on the main floor. All the apparatus, with the exception of the transmitting equipment, has already been received.

The new power line to the station, as well as a gravel road from the Crater Lake highway, has also been completed. G. D. Barr, United States inspector of airways, with headquarters at Oakland, was a visitor at the station yesterday and expressed satisfaction with the progress to date.

Crews to erect the towers and install the equipment are expected to arrive any day and it is expected the station will be in operation by June 1.

**FENCE RIGHT OF WAY SAMS VALLEY ROUTE, DRAW BRIDGE PLANS**

Fencing the right-of-way of the recently ordered Sams Valley-Medford (Midway) highway is now under way, and County Engineer Paul Rynnning is drawing the plans and approach plans for the bridge over Bear creek. Grading will not start until all the preliminary work has been completed. The road will be ready for travel before the heavy hauling of the fruit season starts.

Good progress is being made on the Lake Creek market road. The unit from Eagle Point to Brownboro is about completed, and work will start on the road beyond Brownboro soon. The rock crusher has been hauled from Talent to the quarry near Rocky Hill, and is being set up for operation.

The grubbing and clearing of the road from Butte Falls to Prospect has been completed, and the work of grading will start soon. This road will connect the two communities, give a new route for recreationists, and aid in lumbering operations.

Roads being built by special leases are under way in the Elk Creek and McLeod districts, which will also tap a tourist country.

The maintenance crew of the county engineer's office is now going full blast, keeping the roads on the floor of the valley in shape.
