Marion Vogel, who has been quite ill at his home here, is greatly improved and is able to attend school again.

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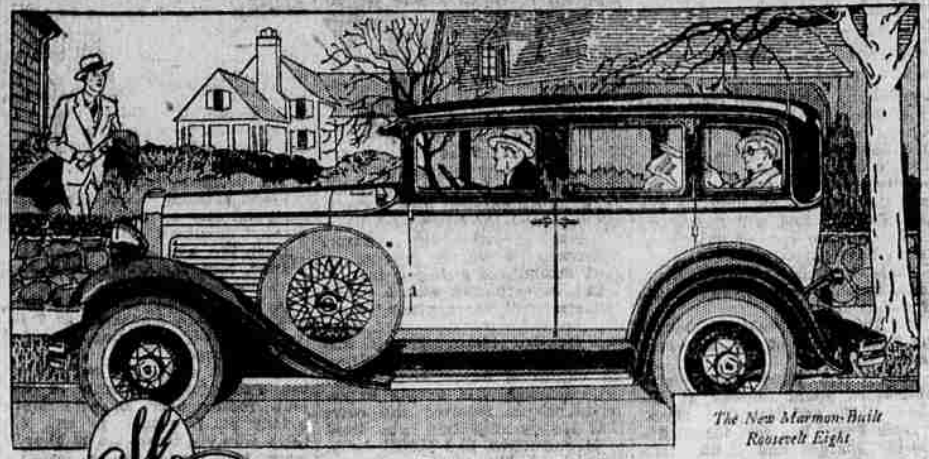
