

TARIFF FINDS LITTLE FAVOR IN THIS STATE

Wool Growers and Vegetable Oil Importers Only Ones Pleased—Lumber Left With Much to Be Desired—Fruit Unaided.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 10.—(AP) The entire organization of the Pacific Co-operative Wool Growers looks with pleasure upon the new tariff bill schedules on wool...

Wheat growers, lumbermen, and growers of potatoes and fruit, however, have yet to express enthusiasm. The bill affects cherries only in that the duty is increased on Maraschino cherries...

Livestock men do not appear to be satisfied with the tariff, although it increases duties on fresh meats.

Charles Dant, of Dant & Russell, one of the leading Pacific northwest lumber companies, said today the new tariff bill leaves much to be desired from the viewpoint of Oregon lumbermen.

"On cedar lumber and shingles," Dant said, "the duty is 25 per cent ad valorem. For years there has been a demand that something be done to shut out the shingles and cedar from Canada, and this demand appears to have been recognized in the new bill.

"But the bill is of no value to this district because it does not include Douglas fir and hemlock." Although the duty on fresh beef is practically doubled by the bill, B. C. Darnall of Swift & Company does not greet the proposition with enthusiasm.

"I do not," he said, "consider a tariff that decreases consumption advantageous to any industry. The fishing industry of Oregon, one of great consequence, receives nothing from the new bill.

Home Comedy at Isis Tonight

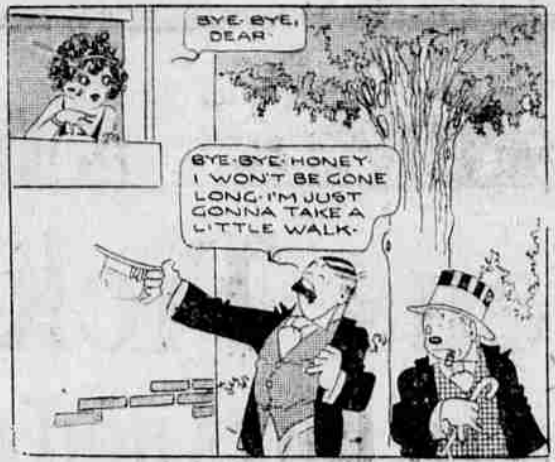

SOLUTION FOR MEXICO'S ILLS BELIEVED NEAR

MEXICO CITY, May 10.—(AP)—Undisputed optimism that a solution would be found for Mexico's church-state difficulties prevailed in many quarters in Mexico City today as the full import of President Portes Gil's stand Tuesday night was recognized.

The president was seen here at having issued an invitation to Archbishop Ruiz, regarded as head of the Mexican Roman Catholic hierarchy, to take the initiative in the conduct of negotiations for a settlement of the three-year-old question.

It was believed this might be done by the prelate proposing a meeting himself with Portes Gil, or by laying the entire matter before the nation for decision. It was felt that if actual conversations took place between representatives of the government and the church the chances for a settlement were particularly strong.

The Mexico City press was unanimous in its wish that a settlement might grow out of the public statements of Archbishop Ruiz and the president.

PORTLAND MERCHANTS AND HAULERS OBJECT TO RECIPROCAL ACT

SALEM, Ore., May 10.—(AP)—Portland merchants and commercial haulers are the main objectors to the new reciprocal traffic arrangement between Oregon and Washington, according to Secretary of State Hal E. Ross, who was one of a group of conferees that discussed the new plan at Olympia Tuesday.

Each state, at the 1929 legislative session, enacted legislation whereby motor vehicles from one state may operate in the other within 20 miles of the border without being licensed in both states. This, it is claimed, works to the advantage of Washington, since most of the commercial vehicles coming into Oregon from that state do all their business in Portland.

FREE MICHAELSON ON BOOZE CHARGE

KEY WEST, Fla., May 10.—(AP)—Representative M. Alfred Michaelson of Illinois was free today of charges that he brought liquor into this country from Cuba, but his brother-in-law, who admitted ownership of the trunks containing the contraband, faced trial on the same charges.

Michaelson was acquitted early this morning by a federal jury on two counts of an indictment, charging importation of liquor and the transportation from Keywest to Jacksonville.

W. O. Hughes, acting federal district attorney, announced shortly after Michaelson's acquittal, that he will bring the same charges against Walter Gramm, a

Chicago coal dealer and Michaelson's brother-in-law, who from the witness stand yesterday admitted the trunks which leaked liquor in a station in Jacksonville and brought the indictment of Michaelson.
