## JACK FROST AGAIN NIPS NON-SMUDGE VALLEY ORCHARDS.

With a minimum temperature of 22 in this city, and of 23 in the orchards located in the low portions of the valley, there was rather heavy smudging during last night up to sunrise this morning by 50 per cent of the orchards.

The smudging orchards escaped damage in the low places, which were damaged by the two previous frosts of this week. Had their pear crops still further nipped, and with a few more such frosts would be liable to lose all their pears, it is claimed.

Had the orchards on the floor of the valley and lighted fires last night they would have suffered a severe pine loss, Floyd Young stated this forenoon. Although Mr. Young had not yet made his rounds of investigation he was inclined to think that most of the unsmudged orchards suffered some damage last night.

The owners of smudging orchards, who are taking no chances these nights, no matter how encouraging the early evening outlook is for no frost, thanks to the evening forecast of Floyd Young that there might be frost, were on the lookout for an unexpected change in weather, and when such a change came, summoned their smudging crews.

The coldest orchards in the valley last night and this morning were those in the 401 district, which began smudging at 2:50 a. m. The general smudging continued until sunrise. The coldest temperatures came between 2 and 4 a. m., and after the latter hour the temperature began rising.
