WOOD—Mrs. O. C. Wood, formerly of Medford, passed away quietly Saturday, May 11, at the home of her son, Louis I. Wood, of Cass City, Mich., at the age of 87.

Yrs. Wood was born in New York state, January 11, 1842, and moving to southeastern Michigan when a child. She was married in 1866 to Oscar C. Wood, a surviving Civil war veteran and member of the Fifth Michigan volunteer cavalry. To the union four children were born: Perry E. Wood (deceased), Cass City, Mich.; Louis I. Wood, Cass City, Mich.; and Mrs. (Dr.) C. R. Simkins and Rev. Cassius M. Wood, both of this city.

After the death of her husband in 1911, Mrs. Wood came to the Pacific coast, living for extended periods at the homes of her daughter and son. Her remarkable activity and well preserved mind were a constant source of comment among her friends everywhere.

Deceased had been a devout and active member of the Methodist Episcopal church for many years. Interment will be made in the family lot at Cass City, Mich.

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CALIFORNIANS ON CARAVAN TRIP TO OREGON CAVERNS

Included in a caravan of 24 motor cars, 100 members of the Sacramento regional conference of the California State Chamber of Commerce passed thru Medford this forenoon en route to Grants Pass where a special program had been prepared for them. A caravan of members of the California Publishers and California Press association is scheduled to arrive here this evening from Klamath Falls, to spend the night at the Hotel Medford, and leave in the morning for Grants Pass and the Oregon Caves.

The editors will be given no special entertainment in Ashland or Medford and will partake of breakfast scheduled for 9 o'clock in Grants Pass. Lunch is scheduled for them at noon at the Oregon Caves and the party is expected to reach the California state line at 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

An elaborate program was given this afternoon at Grants Pass for the chamber of commerce men, including several speeches, with one by Ben Day, attorney for the Southern Pacific, who gave his view points on the proposed extension of the Great Northern railway.

The California men and Grants Pass citizens were to confer on a cooperative advertising plan to be of mutual benefit to southern Oregon and northern California.

HILTON PROTESTS MIDWAY HIGHWAY SETTLEMENT SUM

An undertaking, protesting the settlement offered by the county court for 3.67 acres to be used as right-of-way in the new Midway road, was filed at the county clerk's office yesterday by George Hilton, Jr. He was allowed \$100 for the property, but claims \$1600 is necessary to cover the damage incurred by the new road, including the construction of six new gates. The road will give a direct route from Sams Valley to Medford and was recently ordered constructed by the county court.
