Pressure on Pershing for Amalgamation of A. E. F. With Allied Troops Is Told in Monograph Just Issued by War College

WASHINGTON, May 10.—(AP)—A Christmas day message from Secretary Baker to General Pershing in France in 1917, eight months after the United States entered the World war, is viewed by army historians as a "beacon light" on the pathway of negotiations that were to grow tense over employment of American troops at the front.

The cablegram and Pershing's reply are quoted in part in the monograph, "The Genesis of the American First Army," just published by the historical section of the army war college.

Both British and French pressing upon president their desires to have their forces amalgamated with theirs by regiments and companies and both express belief in impending heavy drive by Germans somewhere along lines of western front," Baker called.

On January 8, Pershing answered: "Have expressed willingness to do in any emergency, but do not think good reason yet exists for us to break up our own divisions and scatter regiments for service among French and British, especially under guise of instruction."

STATE FLAG (By Tureko Maruyama) This is the flag of our state. As you can see, it has many symbols by which the spirit of Oregon is shown.

STATE BIRD (By Lewis Campbell) The Oregon gray (Herbert Aquilina) or Oregon holly, as it is sometimes called, with its bright, glossy leaves, its blossoms of gold and its berries of blue, was designated as the Oregon state flower by the Oregon legislature in 1889.

STATE MOTTO (By Lewis Campbell) This is a Latin phrase which means "She flies with her own wings."

STATE FLAG (By Lewis Campbell) By popular vote of the school children of every county of the state of Oregon in an election held throughout the schools in the spring of 1927 and sponsored by the Oregon Audubon society, and by proclamation of Governor L. L. Patterson in July, 1927, the western meadowlark has been chosen the state bird of Oregon.

STATE MOTTO (By Lewis Campbell) There is more truth to this motto than perhaps the early builders thought. If the results of the recent airport election are studied it would seem as if a lot of Oregonians, southern Oregon ones at least, would soon be doing a lot of flying.
