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SHOULD SENATOR BORAH BE COMMENDED?

THE PORTLAND JOURNAL commends Senator Borah for deserting President Hoover and voting for the debenture plan. Such action is lauded as commendable political independence.

But as we see it, there is no such issue involved in the present instance. The issue is not between party and principle, it is between carrying out a campaign promise and repudiating it.

THE DEBENTURE PLAN was not included in the Republican program. More than that, as an impractical cure-all, similar to the equalization fee in character, it was implicitly renounced.

What then was the duty of Senator Borah and every other member of Congress, professing to believe in the principles of the Republican party and President Hoover?

INSTEAD of doing this Senator Borah joined with the Democrats and other "pseudo-Republicans" in refusing to redeem the promises of the campaign, and insisted upon tacking onto the administration farm relief bill an amendment which, in principle at least, had been repudiated by a majority of the American people.

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Instead of doing this the Senate majority said in effect, "Either accept our pet scheme, never considered in the recent campaign, or you won't have any farm relief at all."

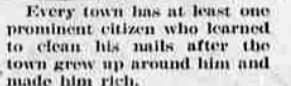
