AIRPORT IN IDEAL LOCATION RIDE IN AIRPLANE SHOWS

A view of the new Medford airport, under construction north of Medford, from an airplane at an altitude of several thousand feet, is an excellent enlightenment as to what the airport will mean to departing and arriving planes, which have been accustomed to the present field at the fairgrounds. An airplane trip over the new field this forenoon by a Mail Tribune reporter, revealed the location to be one of the most ideal in the entire valley.

While construction has hardly begun, the airport appeared to be almost ready, as far as levelness is concerned. Flying a new Eagle Hook biplane, W. A. Williams of Los Angeles, sales promotion manager for the Alexander Aircraft company, nose dived from approximately 3000 feet to within a few hundred feet of the field by way of greeting the tractor, scraper and scarifier laborers below.

In visiting the field, Pilot Williams made a semi-circle of the valley, flying 110 miles an hour, round Roxey Anne and then over the hills around Jacksonville.

He is making a tour of the Pacific coast for the Alexander Aircraft company and this is his first visit to southern Oregon. He was particularly impressed with the airport construction and declared his company would welcome the opportunity of taking part in the dedicatory ceremonies whenever they might be.

Bids for the installation of the night beacons for the air mail between Delta, Cal., and Drain, Ore., will be called for the end of the week, according to J. C. Thompson, division manager of the California Oregon Power company. Preliminary estimates of the work have been computed and sites for the beacon lights were selected a month ago.

S. C. Miller of Boise, Idaho, of the aviation department of the department of commerce, is now on a tour of the Pacific coast, making the final arrangements and visiting the various airports. Miller was here last Friday.

Once the bids are let and the preliminary details arranged, the work will be rushed. It was originally intended to inaugurate night flying over this section June 1, but it will be delayed.

The beacons will be electrically lighted except in a few cases where the lights are in isolated places.

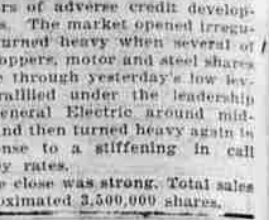
