TWO DAYS MORE TO SECURE FREE TICKET TO CIRCUS

The camels are coming! So are the big and little elephants, lions, monkeys and all the other animals with A. G. Barnes' big circus, day after tomorrow.

All the kiddies will want to attend. What's the use to buy a ticket when any child, 16 years and under, can get a ticket to three shows—main circus, side show and wild west show—free for a new subscriber to the Mail Tribune for two months at \$1.50.

The tickets given away will cost each child \$1.25 if they buy them Thursday.

The above class of customers did not benefit by the reduction on October 1st, which was confined to domestic and commercial lighting customers. Under the new power schedule the first block has been reduced from 8 to 6 cents per kilowatt hour and in the case of the heating and cooking rate large users will be charged for a certain number of kilowatt hours at 1 cent instead of 1 1/4 cents as formerly.

Judging from the number of customers affected and their average use at the present time, it is estimated that they will save, under the new rates, about \$12,500 a year. These new rates have been approved by the public service commission of Oregon and will become effective May 15, 1929.
