

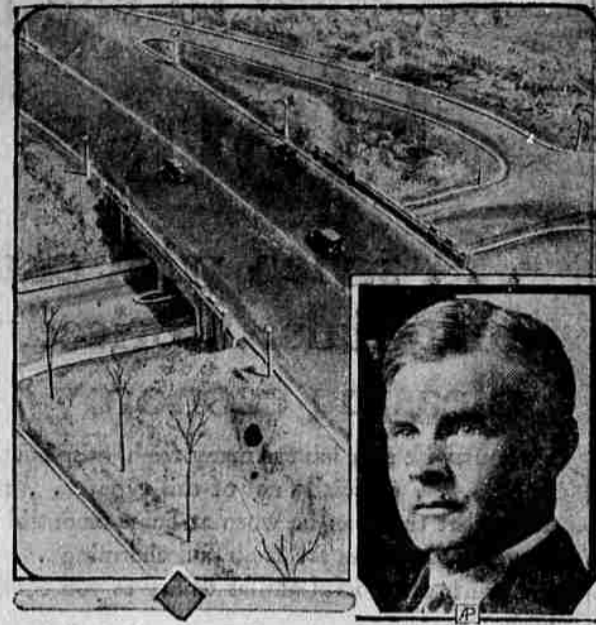
VARIED PROGRAM IN WOLD RECITAL REFLECTS TALENT

Parkway Promises Solve Problem City Congestion

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—Conditions responsible for conception of the super-highway are leading to general use of parkways for rapid movement of light traffic through congested areas. While most of the parkway development has been in metropolitan and suburban areas, the bureau of public roads considers the inherent possibilities of the parkway as so great that it has undertaken a detailed study of the engineering features involved in the success of such a project.
