### SLAYS RIVAL FOR LOVE OF HUSBAND

AMARILLO, Texas, May 15.—(AP)—Mrs. L. P. Stallworth of Amarillo shot and killed Mrs. Grace Morrison of Piataview, Texas, when she met her in front of a hotel in the downtown district here late today. Mrs. Stallworth surrendered to police and told them, they said, that Mrs. Morrison was a rival for her husband's affections.

Before the shooting, Mrs. Stallworth, accompanied by her mother-in-law, had gone to a rooming house in search of Mrs. Morrison. The landlady, who saw Mrs. Stallworth was angry, informed her Mrs. Morrison was not at home and ordered her to leave.

A block from the rooming house Mrs. Stallworth met Mrs. Morrison and fired three times. Police said several witnesses declared the two women were less than three feet apart when Mrs. Stallworth began shooting.

### SENATE TO PROBE INDIAN COMPLAINT

WASHINGTON, May 15.—(AP)—Plans for an intensive investigation of the government's treatment of the Indian in seven western states were announced today by Chairman Frazier of the senate Indian affairs committee.

The investigation, Frazier said, will include reservations and Indian schools in Wisconsin, North and South Dakota, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Montana and Arizona, and will be based on many letters the committee has received complaining of conditions.

### INDIAN CHIEF TO LEAD FAMOUS SOUSA BAND

Chief Kee-Too-Che-Kay-Wee-Okemow, of the Star Blanket band of Cree Indians, from File Hills reservation, near Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada, will be at the conductor's desk when John Philip Sousa's internationally known band plays its third radio concert at 8:15 P. M., Monday night, for the guests of the General Motors family party, of which Cadillac is host.

The concert Monday evening, as usual, will present several of Sousa's own stirring compositions. The program will be heard through a coast to coast network of stations served by the National Broadcasting company, including: KGO, Oakland; KPO, San Francisco; KFI, Los Angeles; KGW, Portland, Ore.

### BIRTH CONTROL BUREAU AIDES GIVEN FREEDOM

NEW YORK, May 15.—(AP)—Two women physicians and three registered nurses arrested in a raid last month on the birth control research clinical bureau and charged with illegal dissemination of birth control information, were discharged by Magistrate Abraham Rosenbluth.

The arrests were made after an investigation by Mrs. Anna K. McNamara, a policewoman, but Commissioner Grover Whalen refused to name the complainant.

The raid caused many protests, and the hearings of the physicians and nurses drew crowds of feminists to the courtrooms.

### WILL BROADCAST AERIAL 'ATTACK' UPON CINCINNATI

DAYTON, O., May 15.—(AP)—Aerial attack on Cincinnati by "enemy" planes in the war maneuvers scheduled to start here today, will be described by a "war correspondent" riding in a specially equipped plane above the combatting planes.

The "war correspondent" will be O. B. Hanson, manager of the plant operations department of the National Broadcasting company, and his words will be spoken into a specially constructed microphone in the plane and broadcast from a 100 kilocycle transmitter aboard the ship.

They will be picked up by a specially constructed receiver located at station WLW, Cincinnati, and there rerouted onto the NBC network.

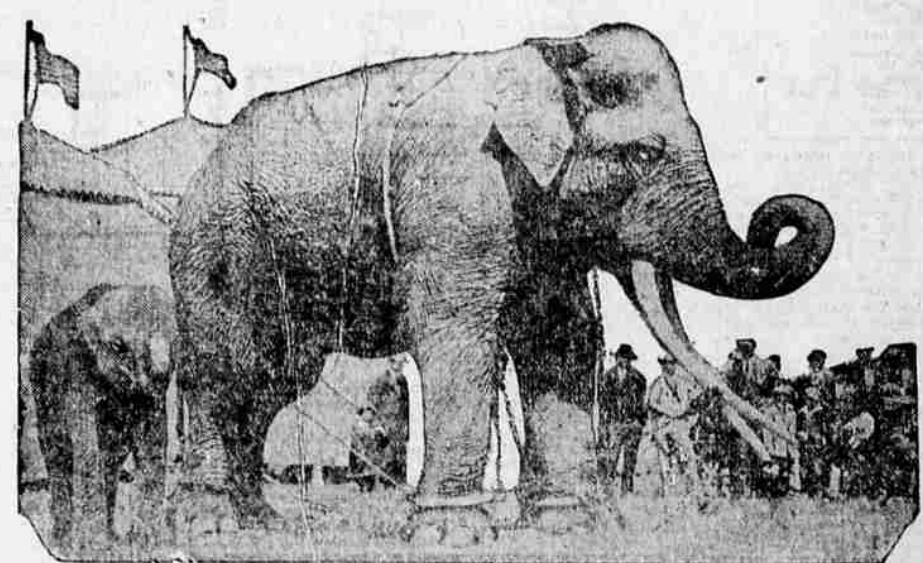
