

GIL PLANS DRY MOVE IN MEXICO

President Initiates Broad Temperance Campaign— Beer and Wine to Be Only Alcoholic Beverages — Women Children Must Abstain—Health Will Be Developed

MEXICO CITY, May 15.—(AP) A broad temperance campaign, looking to eventual drastic prohibition laws, has been initiated by President Emilio Portes Gil. It is to be developed as quickly as national conditions permit, taking perhaps five to ten years for realization. Expenses are to be borne by the government. The first step in the campaign will be the formation next Monday of a national committee on temperance to be headed by the secretary of public health and containing representatives of all classes interested in public welfare. This national committee will have charge of the government's temperance activities, having as its eventual object prohibition of all alcoholic beverages except beer and wine, with public sale of these even to be denied to women and children. A probable first step of the committee will be promulgation of regulations permitting sale of hard liquors only in sealed bottles to be consumed other than where purchased. Listed as "hard" liquors are whiskey, gin and rum. Pulque, the drink most popular among Mexico's poor, was not mentioned in the president's announcement. The government will make every effort to aid in adaptation of breweries and distilleries to other pursuits. Other phases of the campaign include compulsory classes in Mexican schools in which the evils of the drink habit will be taught, a system of reducing in number dancing halls and cabarets, and providing sports activities to develop healthy physiques less likely, it is claimed, to demand alcohol as a stimulant. It is the president's contention that prohibition will be best achieved in Mexico by accustoming the Mexican people to it little by little. While his views on liquor have often been made known heretofore they have had the aspect of a temperance, rather than prohibition. For this reason his announcement late yesterday of a policy contemplating prohibition caused considerable surprise.

WESTERN CANADA HIT BY BLIZZARD

WINNIPEG, Man., May 15.—(AP) —Canada's three western provinces were recovering today from a mid-May snowstorm. Farming operations were halted. Although seeding will be delayed, the snow will not harm the crop already planted, it is believed. Blizzard conditions prevailed throughout northern Manitoba yesterday. There were eight inches at Kelwood, six at Dauphin, four at Neepawa, and two at Virden and Minnedosa. It was unseasonably cold in Winnipeg with snow flurries. Districts in Saskatchewan reported high winds, rain and snow while wintry weather was reported from Alberta areas. Calgary had six inches of snow.

OPEN BEACON BIDS ON SOUTH AIRWAYS

PORTLAND, Ore., May 15.—(AP) Bids will be opened here June 5 at 2 p. m. for installation of 20 revolving beacons and four electric code beacons on the Oregon airways between Roseburg and Portland, a distance of 170 miles. Three of the revolving beacons will be located at intermediate landing fields which also will have boundary lighting.

THOMAS J. CRAIG OF GAME COMM. DIES

WILL G. STEEL PLEDGES SELF TO PARK PLAN

'Father of Crater Lake' Feels Work for Crater Lake and Cascade Reserve at End—State Park System Is Hobby Now.

Feeling mentally and physically good, but possessing little resistance to fatigue, as he is still in the recuperating stage from his long and dangerous flu illness during the winter, Will G. Steel of Eugene, "father of Crater national park," arrived in the city yesterday to leave tomorrow morning for Anna Spring camp to begin his duties as U. S. commissioner for Crater national park for the season. Due to his weakened condition, Mr. Steel will live with Chief Ranger Godfrey in the superintendent's house at Anna Spring camp, until the road is opened to his new, modern park cottage of four rooms at government camp. Mr. Steel, who is 75 years old, has always been so active and for over 50 years has so enjoyed roughing it in the mountains that it seems hard to comprehend that his illness has left him with such little resistance, to accompany his alert mind and eagerness to be of public service. At present he feels that he has but few more years of life ahead, but feels that many more years of life would result to him, if he could take up some new hobby in the way of working night and day to establish his state public parks idea, which so far has only been suggested by him in a newspaper way. He hopes the newspapers of the state will all line up in a campaign to such effect, that Governor Patterson will appoint a committee to have charge. Then that idea would be safely launched until it was carried to completion, he feels. Mr. Steel has always had the idea that every person was put into this world for some specific purpose. For instance, his earlier mission was to see that Crater lake national park came into being, then after that he labored successfully to have the Cascade forest reserve established, and completed after many years of tedious labor his card index of place names of the United States, which he has offered for sale to congress. "My work for Crater national park is at an end, I feel," said Mr. Steel today. "My work for the Cascade reserve is also completed and when congress passes a bill at its next regular session for the purchase of my card index, I have nothing else to look forward to in the way of doing public good.
