ASK FOUR MILLION FOR FIRE GUARDS NATIONAL FORESTS

WASHINGTON, May 16.—(AP)—An appropriation of \$4,000,000 to aid in prevention of fires in national forests by construction and improvement of roads and trails, fire lines and lookouts, is proposed by Senator Cutting, Republican, New Mexico.

Previous appropriations, he said, "have centered on fire suppression with but meager funds for fire prevention, which is acknowledged to be the crux of the fire problem."

His bill also contains a provision for yearly expenditure of \$200,000 for construction of range improvements in the forests to enlarge the use of the ranges and to make possible development of new forage areas for grazing stock. He hopes to obtain passage of the bill at the next session of congress.

WOODLAND, CAL., BANK RAIDED BY ROBBERS

SACRAMENTO, Cal., May 16.—(AP) A special dispatch to the Sacramento Bee from Woodland says that a bank robbery occurred at Woodland, Cal., yesterday. The bank is the Bank of Yolo, and three men and four women assistants to the face downward on the floor of the bank this morning while they held up and robbed the institution of between \$10,000 and \$25,000.

SEE FAILURE IN REFERENDUM OF EXCISE TAX ACT

SALEM, Ore., May 16.—(AP)—Ira C. Powell, president of the First National Bank of Monmouth was elected chairman of group 2 of the Oregon Bankers' association at its annual meeting held here Wednesday. Other officers elected were: Vice-chairman, J. C. Irvine of Lebanon; secretary, Joseph H. Albert of Salem (re-elected); treasurer, W. B. Hill of Mill City. The elected officers, with C. J. Esty of Woodburn and A. F. Gault of Corvallis are the executive committee.

C. C. Chapman of Portland, who addressed the group of about 50 bankers attending the meeting, predicted failure of the present attempt at referendum of the excise tax act. He warned the state in commission to use discretion in administration of the act to avoid a series of lawsuits.

Encroachment of a substitute building materials is largely responsible for the slump in the lumber industry in recent years, according to Sinclair A. Wilson of Linton, who addressed the bankers of that industry. Other things blamed were poor advertising.

AIRPLANE PLANT LOCATED SALEM

SALEM, Ore., May 16.—(AP) Definite decision to locate here the plane manufacturing of the Eyerly Air Transport company for which Salem, Eugene and Albany have been being was announced Wednesday by Lee Eyerly, president of the company.

Negotiations are practically concluded for the purchase of a tract of land adjacent to the municipal airport, now under construction southeast of the city, where necessary factory buildings will be erected and manufacturing operations will be under way inside a month, Eyerly said.

BOSTON POST HAD OFFER BY UTILITY

WASHINGTON, May 12.—(AP)—Richard Grazer, editor and publisher of the Boston, Mass., Post, testified today before the federal trade commission that a Boston advertising man who claimed to represent the power interests of Samuel Insull last February made an offer of \$20,000,000 in cash to buy the Post.

Appearing in connection with the commission's inquiry into financial interests in newspapers by public power utilities, Grazer declared his managing editor, C. D. Carberry, in making a report on the bid, said the offer was "nine tenths bluff."

GENERAL HINES VISITS PORTLAND

SALEM, Ore., May 16.—(AP)—General John L. Hines of San Francisco, commander of the ninth corps area of the United States army, who is now inspecting troops at Vancouver, will be in Portland tomorrow, Adjutant General George A. White announced today. He will be a guest of the Oregon national guard reserve corps. General Hines was formerly chief of staff of the army.

SHATTLE, May 14.—(AP)—With both men shooting three-over par, Don Moss and George Will gave the University of Oregon a five-point lead at the end of the first 18 holes today in the Pacific Coast conference golf championship play. The Webfooters shot a total score of 150.

WASHINGTON.—The move to preserve Ford's theater—the place where John Wilkes Booth fatally shot Abraham Lincoln—has hit a snag in congress.

Rep. Charles L. Underhill of M. A. sachussets believes that preservation of the 14 1/2 historic building would, in effect, be erecting a monument to the murderer of the great president.

Richard Yates, member of congress from Illinois, is sponsoring a bill to make the old theater fireproof, thus converting it into a national war memorial museum and a place where the Grand Army of the Republic may hold its meetings.

Mr. Underhill is very definite in his opposition. "The other day when Representative Yates arose in the house and asked unanimous consent to have his bill considered, Underhill objected and with quite a show of spirit told his colleagues why.

"Perpetuation of a building," he said, "which was the site of a tragedy from which the world has not yet recovered, will not be a monument and memento to the life, works, mercy and kindness of our martyred president. Rather would it become a monument to his murderer."

"I will do everything in my power to secure proper commemoration of the old veterans—if that is what is wanted, preservation except vote for the preservation of this gruesome, morbid, disgraceful monument to the memory of a murderer."

Ford's theater is directly across the street from the little brick house in which Lincoln died. This house contains the famous Lincoln collection of Lincoln relics which the federal government purchased last year at a cost of \$50,000. The Yates bill provides for the transfer of these bits of Lincolniana to the remodeled theater.

Only the shell of the theater now remains. The balconies, seats and stage were removed many years ago, and it is now properly a dusty relic of history. Row upon row of files filled with mysterious government matter that have accumulated through the years are lodged here.

Ulysses S. Grant, III, director of public buildings and public parks in Washington and the man who would have charge of the reconstruction of the theater, does not share in the view expressed by Mr. Underhill.

"It appraises the importance of the crime committed in this building," said Colonel Grant. "Ford's theater, however, occupies such an important place in history and is so associated in the public mind with Mr. Lincoln that I doubt if any ignoring of the site and physical remnants would tend to efface the memory of the crime."
