CHILDREN REWARDED FOR WAIT ON CIRCUS BY COLORFUL SIGHTS

Long hours of waiting, cloudy forebodings and youthful misgivings were forgotten at 11:30 today when the crowds of small boys and girls who lined the railroad tracks throughout the morning caught sight of the engine that pulled the Al G. Barnes circus into Medford from the south. Squeals of delight and shouts of excitement filled the air as the first long line of red box cars drove into sight. Then came the colorful circus wagons with their golden frames and mysterious enclosures—blue, red, green, white—every color under the sun was there.

CODLING MOTH TO HATCH SOON SAY COUNTY EXPERTS

The first codling moth eggs will be hatching pretty uniformly over the valley the last few days of this month. The first cover spray for apples should be on by May 25th. As there will be only a small portion of the codling moth eggs laid at the time of this spray and no young scale or spider mites, it is advisable to use only 3 lbs. of powdered arsenate of lead per 100 gallons of water and no oil. Leaf hoppers and aphids can be controlled by adding 1 pint of Black Leaf 40 and 1/2 lb. spreader per 100 gallons.

Growers should be prepared to apply a second cover spray also known as the ten day spray, early in June, and should plan irrigation accordingly. The second cover spray will be timed to be just ahead of the main hatch of codling moth eggs. A spray notice will be in the paper the last part of May indicating the date when this spray should be on and will include instructions as to the use of oil.

Pears The green fruit worm is becoming active. They are feeding on the foliage now but will soon be large enough to injure the fruit. Growers who have just put on a cover spray for the green fruit worm are putting one on may delay the first cover spray for codling moth so that it will be on by June 1st. Those who have not put on protection should have the codling moth cover spray on by May 25th. Use 2 to 3 lbs. of powdered arsenate of lead per 100 gallons and no oil in this spray.

LOS ANGELES, May 16.—(AP)—Marjorie J. Berger, Hollywood income tax counsellor, today was fined the fifth of a series of federal grand jury indictments against her in connection with returns submitted for film stars.

The latest indictment, returned yesterday, charged her with "fraudulently reporting the income of Eleanor Boardman," actress wife of King Vidor, film director for 1928. Miss Boardman's income for that year was listed by Miss Berger as \$41,824.75. Miss Berger deducted nearly \$16,000 and submitted a tax statement of \$15,000.75. The government contends the tax should have been \$3,541.93 after deductions.
