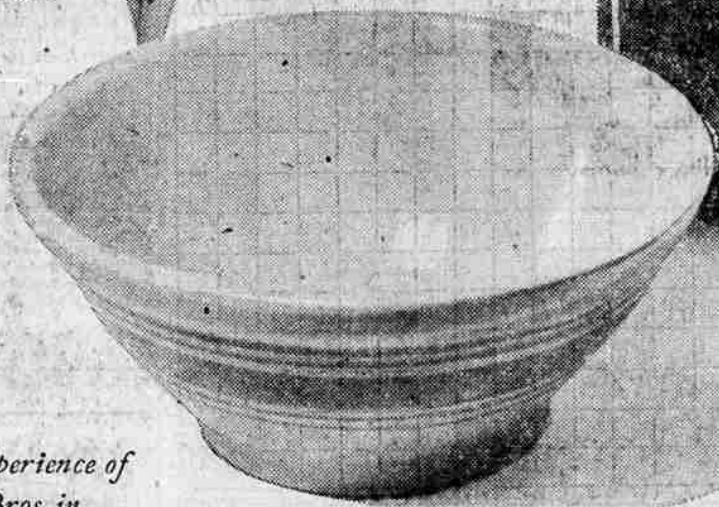

EDEN PRECINCT, Ore., May 17.—(Special) H. C. High of Ashland has the contract for the new addition to the Newbry and Sons packing house being constructed at Phoenix. The old house, built a couple of years ago will be raised so as to be two stories all the way thru and the twenty-six foot addition will also be the same height. This will give the firm one of the most modern packing plants in the valley.
