KENTUCKY THRILLS TO DERBY DAY

Turf Classic Expected to Draw Notable Throng Tomorrow — Weather Prospects Dubious — 'Horse Race' Promised, Rain or Shine — Record Radio Hook-Up Planned.

LOUISVILLE, May 17.—(AP) Volt-tear drew the rail position today in the Kentucky derby to be run tomorrow. Paraphrase got second position and Chicatte third.

The favorites had no luck in the drawing for post positions as they were far from the rail in the list of 26 eligibles, the largest ever named to start in the classic race. Blue Larkspur, E. R. Bradley's entry which will be coupled in the betting with Bay Beauty, had 26th position; and Bay Beauty got 24th place. Windy City was in 24th place from the rail and Clyde Van Dusen was 25th.

By Alan J. Gould, Associated Press Sports Editor. LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 17.—(AP) East and west, north and south will send its blue-blooded horseflesh in quest of the classic three-year-old honors of the American turf tomorrow in the 56th running of the Kentucky Derby.

The race will be worth \$64,000, of which approximately \$54,000 will go to the victor. The weather prospects are dubious, but rain or shine, heavy going or fast, the experts predict a "horse race," and the promoters expect a notable throng of upwards of 75,000 to jam the picturesque Churchill Downs.

Millions more are expected to tune in on the thrills of America's most colorful turf classic over a record radio hook-up for the derby, arranged by the National Broadcasting company and its associated stations.

Derby day is Kentucky's day of days.

Kentucky, as usual, has its favorite. The roar of the crowd tomorrow will be from the heart, as well as the pocketbook, as Blue Larkspur, the pride of the blue grass, comes home first in the colors of the Idle Hour farm of Colonel Edward R. Bradley. The Bradley organization suffered a severe blow in the loss of its chief trainer, "Dick" Thompson, now seriously ill after an operation for appendicitis Wednesday night, but there is every assurance that Blue Larkspur nevertheless will go to the post fit and ready.

The famous son of Black Servant, declared good in any kind of going, probably will face the barrier a 2 to 1 favorite, with Clyde VanDusen, carrying the colors of H. P. Gardner, second choice, probably around 4 to 1, on the basis of wagering reported today.

Twice before, in 1921 and 1926, Colonel Bradley has seen his horses finish one-two in the derby. The chances are against a repetition of this honor tomorrow, but the famous Kentucky turfman will attempt it by also saddling Bay Beauty, a son of Otack Toney, for the classic.

Mishaps and disappointments have wrecked a good portion of the original derby entry list, but there is every indication of keen sectional rivalry in the field that remains. The far west pins its hopes chiefly upon Naishapur, winner of the Tijuana derby and a close second in the rich Cofroth handicap on the Mexican track.
