Others who have defects corrected during the summer may receive their pins in September in time to take part in the health exercises to be held on Children's Day at the Jackson county fair in September.

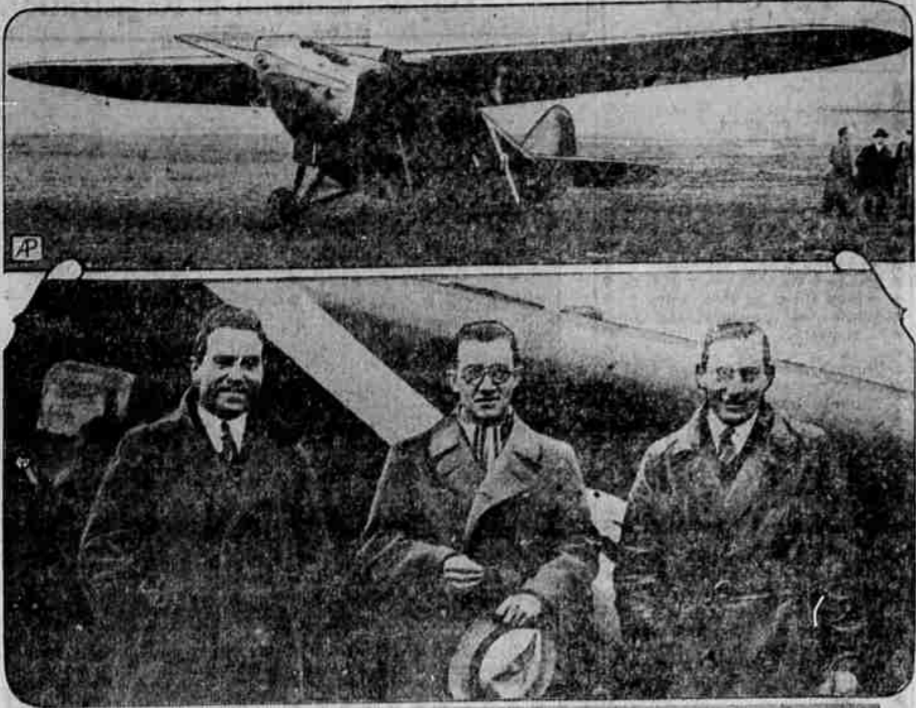

Farm Pointers

Buttermilk or skim milk kept before chickens all the time helps to supply protein, minerals and vitamins and also acts as a laxative, finds the Oregon experiment station. Less protein is needed in the mash where a supply of buttermilk to drink is provided. Dried buttermilk or skim milk may be included in the mash to 10 to 12 per cent under conditions where it is not possible to obtain skim milk or buttermilk at a reasonable cost.

When setting out asparagus it pays to use selected crowns, believes the Oregon experiment station as they are not only larger and make a finer growth after being set out, but also produce a better stand of plants. That one-year-old crowns are superior to older ones is the general experience. The yield of an asparagus bed ordinarily increases until the seventh year, after which there is a noticeable decline, although it may continue to produce profitably for 15 to 20 years.

Ladino clover, being a rather shallow rooted type of plant, usually does well in Oregon, but prefers land that sub-irrigates during a considerable part of the summer or that may be irrigated regularly. It is looked upon as a rather long lived perennial, says the experiment station.

Tuberculosis of chicken is quite readily transmitted to hogs, being confined chiefly to the head and neck region, finds the Oregon experiment station. Its transmissibility to cattle is considered a possibility, but has not yet been proved.
