

130 RESIDENTS GO ON TOUR OF HOMES PICNIC AT NOON

Enthusiasm and sincere appreciation marked the conduct of the large number of local residents who took advantage of the latter home tour, conducted through the county Friday by Mabel Mack, county home demonstration agent, as a local feature of national better homes week. Requests to repeat the excursion next year have been frequent.

The tour started at 9:30 Friday morning when more than 130 people met with Mrs. Mack at the H. A. Kluener home south of Ashland. Here the demonstration agent extended greetings and called special attention to the furniture of the home. The ornate, hand-carved, hand-made pieces in the beautiful dining room were brought from Switzerland some years ago, having been made in the old country by a relative of the Kluener family.

The J. H. Moore home also south of Ashland, was next visited. Here the well planned grounds with its exquisite shrubs, plants and flowers, personally cultivated and cared for by Mrs. Moore were studied by the group. The new Dutch colonial home recently built by the Southern Oregon Construction company on Glen Oak Court, attracted special interest due to its clever floor plan and interior decoration. The sunken panels of mahogany as a unique decorative scheme were noted.

The tour then proceeded to the Jackson County Fair grounds, where a picnic lunch was served. Ice cream and coffee for the meal were furnished through the courtesy of the following merchants: Economy Groceries, Sanders' Gold Seal creamery, and Crescent dairy. Rev. Carmen E. Mell spoke on "Home Influences on Character Building," and Jesse D. McComb, state demonstration leader gave an interesting reading on modern home conveniences.

The Sheriff Jennings home on Jacksonville highway was the object of the next visit and its compact floor plan and many delightful conveniences in the way of built-in features were studied.

The interior decoration of the W. W. Prickett home now almost completed on the Jacksonville highway elicited considerable enthusiasm. An indoor swimming pool was among the features here. Both the interior and exterior of the J. R. Tyrrell home on Jacksonville highway were noted in detail, and the grounds of the well known Em'l Britt home in Jacksonville with its luxuriant growths and well planned garden effects also found favor.

The John Anderson home near Central point was the last point of the tour. During the cold storage room, said to be an example of the most modern method of refrigeration for rural homes was explained by Jack Moore of the Medford Electric company, who had charge of the installation.

ARMY CHAPLAIN ON WAY TO HONOLULU VISITS KIN HERE

World peace can most nearly be accomplished by those who know the meaning of war, in the opinion of Captain O. W. Reynolds, veteran chaplain of the World war, who, with Mrs. Reynolds and small daughter, Elizabeth, have spent the past week with Captain Reynolds' brother, C. L. Reynolds, proprietor of the Hotel Holland, and family.

Rev. Reynolds, who served with the United States army on the fighting lines of France, and has visited many points through Europe on army duty since the war, will leave with his family today for San Francisco where they will take the transport, Somme for Honolulu, next Saturday. The chaplain having been transferred to Hawaii will receive a definite assignment after his arrival.

For the past four years Captain Reynolds has served as Protestant chaplain at the Fitzsimmons General Hospital in Denver, the largest hospital under military jurisdiction in the world. There are 85 officers stationed there, most of whom are physicians, and 1500 tubercular patients, 75 percent of whom the officials are able to cure.

The Fitzsimmons hospital, according to Captain Reynolds, is known as the United States laboratory, and some of the greatest specialists in the world are carrying on experiments there all the time. Remarkable discoveries in medical science have been developed there, he said.

On the subject of World Peace, the army chaplain described the advocated abandonment of the standing army as an illogical fallacy.

"There is no one organized group that wants peace more; nor that understands the meaning of peace as against the horrors of war, than does the army," he said. "It would be just as good sense to abandon the police department in the cities as to take the army away from the country. The army is the only scientific, well organized instrument of peace we have. Its duty is not to make war, but to enforce peace."


