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HIGGINS DEPARTS FOR SO. AMERICAN ELECTRICAL POST

Clyde R. Higgins, well known member of the Copco organization, left last week for New York, from which port he will sail for Buenos Aires, South America. Mr. Higgins will be affiliated with W. M. Shepard, former vice president and general manager of The California Oregon Power company, who recently accepted an executive position with the American & Foreign Power corporation in Argentina, with headquarters in Buenos Aires. Higgins will join Mr. Shepard in New York and they will sail together for South America. The California Oregon Power company for approximately five years, joining the Copco engineering department soon after he was graduated from Stanford university, where he majored in electrical engineering. He later became assistant to H. L. Walther, division manager of the Rogue River division, leaving this work to become assistant to Mr. Shepard in the commercial department of the home office. He was a tireless worker in the Copco Forum, the employees' organization of The California Oregon Power company, and will be greatly missed by his many partners in progress. He was also the first editor of "Forum Flashes," the employees' monthly publication.

Mr. Higgins will be the sixth Copco man to take up public service work in South America, the others being Paul H. McKee, L. F. Ivanhoe, Russell Hackett, Lee Leavelle, all of whom are now in Rio de Janeiro, and W. M. Shepard, who will be located at Buenos Aires. BREWER ARRIVES FOR INSPECTION COPCO PROPERTY. C. M. Brewer, newly appointed vice president and general manager of The California Oregon Power company, arrived here today to confer with local officials of the company and to make a trip over the various division properties of the Copco system. Mr. Brewer, who is one of the best known public utility executives in the northwest, has been vice president and general manager of the Mountain States Power company since January 1, 1919, and has been connected with the Hydroelectric organization since August 15, 1909.
