

### SLAY GUARDS OF TIJUANA MONEY IN BOLD HOLDUP

SAN DIEGO, Cal., May 20.—(AP)—Raiders' receipts from Tijuana, Mexico, estimated at a huge figure were seized and two men shot to death with a machine gun on the National City Pike road late this morning in one of the most daring daylight robberies in the history of San Diego.

The dead men are N. Monroy and A. Borreto, two Mexican special officers, who were guarding the money on the usual Monday trip to San Diego banks. They were shot to death when they refused to halt at the command of the robbers, who had pulled their car to the side of the road as the money automobile approached.

The car containing the money had just left National City and was headed north on the Pike road when the robbery occurred.

The car containing the money was literally riddled with bullets, according to reports. The peace officers slumped in the car, the bandits, two of them, according to the best information available, seized the money and vanished in their car.

### BRIDAL PAIR DIE ON FERRY BOAT IN SUICIDE PACT

NEW YORK, May 20.—(AP)—A soldier and his bride of two days executed a suicide pact on the statue of liberty ferry boat yesterday.

Charles B. Canto, attached to the military police stationed on Bedloe's Island, the site of the statue of liberty, shot his 21-year-old wife, Jean, and himself as they waited for the ferry. General Meigs to make his first trip of the day. Their bodies were found by other soldiers on the ferry who had been awakened by the shots.

Near the bodies were three penciled notes, one to the minister who had married them Friday, the others to Canto's superior officers. In the notes to the officers, Mrs. Canto took responsibility for her own death and asked that her husband be absolved from blame if he survived her. She wrote: "We cannot live together here. We prefer to live together in death. I join, alone, an responsibility for this act and not chick. I forced him to do it."
