Perry O. Crawford will go to Chicago about June 1st, to assume his new berth. Mrs. Crawford will follow him in the early fall, according to present plans.

### FLOWER SHOW OF MEDFORD GARDEN CLUB IS PLANNED

The Medford Garden club is planning for its June Rose show, and those in charge are promising that this one will be the largest and best flower show ever held in southern Oregon. Complete lists for entries will be published soon and all are asked to study them carefully, so that variety and classification be known before the exhibitor asks for entry card.

The club is following the rules and regulations of the Federated Garden clubs of the state and some of the most important of these are as follows:

Only one entry will be allowed an exhibitor in each class.

Artistic arrangements must be the work of the exhibitor. At the discretion of the judges a first, second or third prize may be awarded to exhibits of merit when the entries are insufficient to form a class.

Two persons shall not exhibit from the same garden.

The ribbons recommended by the Federated Garden clubs will be used and are blue, first prize; red, second prize; green, third prize; gold, award of merit.

Besides roses, iris, peonies, columbine, sweet peas and other flowers will be shown and judged.

One of the new sections at this show will be the "living room arrangement." 1. bowls of cut flowers; 2. baskets of cut flowers; 3. vases of cut flowers. These will be judged on quality, arrangement and suitability of receptacles.

Grasses and community clubs are asked to enter displays and these will be awarded prizes. Space for these and for the professional displays should be arranged for beforehand by communicating with Jane Svedicor, general chairman.

### "The Scarlet Lady" Scores a Hit Here

There is a great audience appeal in "The Scarlet Lady," which

PORTLAND, May 21. — (AP) — With his arm amputated below the elbow, Douglas Grizzard, 23, cage man with the Al G. Barnes circus, was in a hospital here today, suffering severely from shock and loss of blood. His arm was horribly mangled yesterday when a Bengal tiger clawed and chewed it as Grizzard was petting the animal through the bars of its cage. Amputation of the arm was necessary.

Several persons witnessed the attack. Grizzard was petting the tiger when it suddenly grabbed his hand with its teeth and kept tugging until the man's entire arm was inside the cage. Before help arrived Grizzard's whole arm had been mangled.
