

CAR FLEET TO ARRIVE TOMORROW

Goodrich Silver Fleet to Be Welcomed 3.45 P. M. Wednesday—Caravan Represents 90 Per Cent Total Output American Autos—Street Parade to Follow Reception.

The fleet's not in—but it's coming. A caravan of 15 gleaming silver cars, driven by young college graduates, will roll into Medford tomorrow afternoon, Wednesday, about 3:45 p. m. Mayor A. W. Pipes, W. A. Folger, former treasurer of the Goodrich Rubber company, and a group of city officials will welcome the procession at the city hall.

Fifteen different makes of silver-hued cars comprise the Goodrich fleet which is making a goodwill demonstration tour of the United States. The fleet represents products of the manufacturers who make more than 90 per cent of the total output of motor cars, including Auburn, Essex, Chrysler, Ford, Hulek, Chevrolet, Huppmobile, Packard, Lincoln, Whippet, Pontiac, Nash, Oldsmobile, Studebaker and Mack truck.

Starting from New York on January 23, the spectacular fleet has traveled approximately 12,000 miles to date, using the same Goodrich tires. Upon completing the lengthy test run, which will take them back to the starting place in New York, the cars will have been driven close to 40,000 miles.

Visit Filmland. Few points of interest en route have been overlooked by the crew of 19 pilots who are making the most of their opportunity to get acquainted wherever they stop. During their visit in Los Angeles, they were entertained by the MGM studios and posed with various motion picture stars for news-reel pictures.

C. H. Taylor, manager of the Portland branch of the Pacific Goodrich Rubber company, arrived here May 18, to make arrangements for the fleet's reception in Medford. He is being assisted by H. B. Dalrymple, district representative of the Goodrich company, with headquarters in this city. Street parades are scheduled to follow the official greeting at the city hall when Mayor Pipes, members of the local traffic force and Mr. Folger meet the caravan of silver cars. The entire fleet will remain in Medford tomorrow night and from here will continue north Thursday morning. The cars will be on display at the Lewis Super-Service station at the corner of Eighth and Front streets, after the parade. Sightseeing trips through the Rogue River valley will be included in the entertainment program for the pilots.

Following is the fleet schedule for southern Oregon and Williamson valley cities: Wednesday, May 22—Arrive at Oregon line at 2:15 p. m. and met by Oregon state police. Five minute stop in Ashland. Arrive at Medford at 3:45 p. m. Civic ceremony at city hall. Remain overnight. Cars on public display.

Thursday, May 23—Leave Medford, 8 a. m. Arrive Grants Pass at 9:10 for 15-minute stop. Arrive Roseburg 12:45 p. m. Stop for lunch. Five-minute stops in Sutherlin, Oakland and Drain. Arrive Cottage Grove at 3:45 p. m. for short stop. To be met at Springfield bridge by Eugene traffic officers and escorted to city hall for civic ceremony at 4:45 p. m. Remain overnight. Cars on public display.

Friday, May 24—Leave Eugene, 7:20 a. m. Five-minute stops in Junction City and Albany. Arrive Salem at 10:45 a. m. Reception by governor and civic ceremony at state capital at 11 a. m. Leave Salem at 11:30 a. m. for Portland, via Rickwood and Amity. Arrive McMinnville at 12:40 p. m. Demonstration, reception and lunch. Leave McMinnville at 2 p. m. Arrive Portland city limits at 3:20 and escorted to city hall via Terwilliger boulevard by city traffic police. Arrive city hall, 3:40 p. m. for civic ceremony.

DISMISS 28 COUNTY SCHOOLS THIS WEEK

Pitt, North Phoenix and Uniontown. The teacher for all these schools have already been re-hired for next year.

FOLGER ONCE HAD IMPORTANT PLACE GOODRICH RUBBER

When the Goodrich Silver Fleet arrives here tomorrow afternoon, in the front ranks of the welcoming committee will be W. A. Folger. There's a reason. For 16 years, from 1812 to 1910, this same genial, white-haired Medford resident was treasurer of the Goodrich Rubber company in Akron, Ohio.

"In 1894 Dr. B. F. Goodrich, founder of the rubber company predicted that there'd be a time when its sales for one year would amount to half a million dollars," Mr. Folger told a Mail Tribune reporter. "Sales for a single day now average exactly that amount. The first year that Mr. Folger served as treasurer for the company the sales were approximately \$2,000,000. Last year, 1928, the total income was over \$150,000,000, with branches located all over the world."

At the time the Goodrich organization was formed in 1870, Dr. Goodrich borrowed \$1000, each from 18 men in Akron and \$5000 from a man in the east. The city gave him the use of an old factory. In 1880 the company was incorporated for \$100,000. The founder died in 1888 and the treasurer at that time, Col. George Perkins, was made president. Mr. Folger related. He resigned from his position as cashier of the Second National bank of Akron to become treasurer of Goodrich.

"The Silver Fleet tour is the biggest thing that the Goodrich company ever undertook," the former treasurer declared in discussing the caravan of silver cars which will arrive in Medford tomorrow afternoon at 3:45.

After resigning from the rubber company in 1910, Mr. Folger bought tickets for himself and his family and set out to see all of the United States there was to see. Finally, convinced that the Rogue River valley was an ideal place for a retired businessman to enjoy himself, Mr. Folger located in Medford.

BIG SMOKER SET FOR MONDAY EVE

Medford and southern Oregon boxing fans will see what is promised to be one of the best all-star boxing smokers seen in Medford for months next Monday night at the army, where four six-round events will be staged, preceded by a curtain raiser.

Jackie McCoy, a former Seattle boy, who has now adopted Medford as his home, will meet Billy Church of Portland. Church is well known in the coast boxing world, and is expected to give the local man something to think about. Pat Padelford will also meet a hard man, Battling Eddemann, of Bend. Eddemann has been winning most of his bouts, and is not taking Pat seriously.

Another big feature of the card is Red Sorenson of Central Point, ex-army champ of New York, and Frankie Monroe of Hood River. Monroe has fought in Medford before and is a tough customer for any lighter, causing fans to wonder how good Sorenson might have to be to avoid a "beatdown." In the first six-round bout of the evening, Joe Corbett of Roseburg will meet Steamboat Jackson of Klamath Falls, and this bout also promises to be hard fought.

EAGLE POINT PAVILION OPEN SATURDAY NIGHT

After having been closed for two weeks, while its proprietor, Luke Kincaid, joined interests with A. W. Walker, local dance pavilion man, the Eagle Point pavilion will be reopened next Saturday night, according to an announcement yesterday. Mr. Kincaid will no longer be connected with the fair grounds hall and it was not known today whether Mr. Walker will continue to operate it, following the dissolution of the partnership formed a short time ago.

Mr. Kincaid regards his Eagle Point pavilion as more lucrative and will continue to operate dances until 3 a. m. on Saturday night until June 29, when a new state law goes into effect. A good orchestra will furnish the music and the hall is to be given some special decorations.

TRI-MOTOR PLANES TO BE USED ON NEW LINE

Tri-motor, 12-passenger cabin planes manufactured by Fokker Aircraft corporation of America, will be used on the Portland-Salt Lake line which will be established this summer by the Varney Air lines.

A hangar 100 feet by 220 feet will be erected at Swan Island to house the big ships. It will be open at both ends. Besides room for three of the Fokkers there will be space for four speed mail planes and three small planes, which can almost be run in under the Fokker wings. It is estimated the structure will cost \$50,000.
