

### PREPARING PLAN BEAUTIFUL HOME FOR B. THIEROLF

Work will start within two weeks upon the construction of a \$15,000 home for Bert Thierolf, at the northwest corner of Crown Avenue and Berkeley Way, in a district where a number of the city's beautiful residences have been erected within the past year. Plans for the building are being prepared by Frank C. Clark, architect.

The site of the home, on a slight knoll, commands a view of the city and valley. The architecture will be of Grecian or early colonial period, with large windows.

The home will be 33 feet by 64 feet in dimensions, two stories high, part basement and with oak floors throughout. The home will be electrically equipped.

The first floor will consist of a large entrance hall, living room, dining room, kitchen, breakfast nook, maid's room, a large pantry and series of closets. A five foot stairway will lead from the main entrance hall to the second story. There will also be a sun room with fireplace.

On the west end of the building there will be a large sun porch. A garage will be erected at the east end.

The second floor will consist of four large bedrooms.

The place will have feature landscape gardening, with a wealth of shrubs and flowers.

### VOTE TO UNLOAD PROBE PROPOSAL TEXTILE UNREST

WASHINGTON, May 23.—(AP)—The senate manufacturers committee voted 6 to 5 today to refer the proposed investigation into labor conditions in the textile industry to the federal trade commission.

The resolution will be reported to the senate in that form. Senator Wheeler, Democrat, Montana, the author, will make a fight to have the investigation conducted by a senate committee as originally proposed.

Because of the close division in the committee, another sharp line up is in prospect in the senate on whether to refer the inquiry to the federal trade commission or to a senate committee.
